## Avery C. Moore Says it is One of Idaho's Coming Towns.

Avery C. Moore, editor of the Weiser World, published at Weiser, Idaho, is in Salt Lake today en route to New York, where he will attend the national conference on immigration as an Idaho

Mr. Moore states that he considers Mr. Moore states that he considers Weiser to be one of the coming idaho towns, and that its population is in-creasing very rapidly.
