COAST WANTS GAME.

Utah's Football Reputation Gaining in Prestige to the West.

Declared As Such By the National Baseball Commission.

Cincinnati, Oct. 14.—The California State League today was declared to be an outlaw organization by the National Baseball commission. By this ruling players who are now playing with the league in violation of contracts with national agreement clubs are "forever ineligible to participate in any games played by the national agreement clubs."

All players who are now with the California league who are also players of national agreement clubs, and who have failed to report to the respective clubs having title to them, and upon their failure to do so, shall also be ineligible to be forever included in any in-

ternational competition. The commission also notifies the players of all national agreement clubs that they will be prohibited from playing with any club belonging to the California State League.

It is proposed that if a coast trip is taken by Coach Maddock this team will be objective. The Utah team is sufficiently strong to guarantee a good record, and the California State League individuals are brought into the season's best form, and increase their ability to play a team game. The faults of Saturday's showing were incidental to lack of practice, rather than to fundamental weakness.

UNION SYMPATHIZERS CAUSE SHOOTING AFFRAY

San Francisco, Oct. 14.—The annoying of the non-union crew of a Guerrero street car by union sympathizers tonight led to a shooting affray in which two passengers were wounded. One of the passengers was a woman, who was on the car fell off during the excitement and sustained what is thought to be a fractured skull. She is in a critical condition.

The car was outward bound from the ferries, and during the early part of the trip some of the men aboard began to taunt the conductor and motorists.

Twenty-sixth street was reached, the lights were suddenly turned off by a passenger on the front platform. Motorman Patrick O'Donnell at once stopped the car and drawing his revolver fired five shots into the car.

Michael T. Penney, a cement worker received two of the bullets in the right breast and another lodged in the breast of Charles Holderson, a stevedore.

Miss Emily Ruthie, in her anxiety to escape, fell off the car and it is believed her skull is fractured. While the men are seriously injured, they are likely to recover.

Penney was arrested and released on \$2,000 cash bail by Judge Conlan. The conductor fled and could not be found.

FIVE SUSPECTS ARRESTED.

Believed to be Persons Who Dynamited the Joplin News-Herald Plant.

Joplin, Mo., Oct. 14.—Five persons

suspected of dynamiting the plant

on the night of Sept. 12 were arrested this morning at 2 o'clock.

They are Minnie St. Clair, Charles Smith, W. S. Martin, known as the Kansas City "Kid," Bessie Beam and Hazel Rayes, alias Hazel Reed.

The parties were arrested by the sheriff and chief of police at the home of Minnie St. Clair.

The evidence against them is very strong.

Minnie St. Clair formerly ran a notorious bawdy house in this city, while all the rest have police records.

The prisoners are being put through a rigid cross-examination, and a confession is expected in a few hours.
