The rail-roads are doing their best to meet the requirements, according to the intertsate commerce commission, but no practica-ble device seems to be available. The commission's recently appointed board of experts to promote the safety of rail-way operation announced today that it would be glad to examine devices of this character.

Yerbey of Sierre Leon, in a report describes some of the primitive features of the trade and invites Americans of inventive mind to contrive a machine to do the work now done laboriously by hand. There is little cultivation of the nut palm trees beyond allowing them to grow and removing the nuts that others may take their places. The hulling work too is crudely done. From Sierra Leon there were exported during 1907 almost 35,009 tons of nuts and 617,997 gallons of the oil, valued at \$2,500,000. Most
