CONFERENCE.—The General Conference commences to-morrow morning in the New Tabernacle at 10 a. m.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.—This evening at 7.30 o'clock the Republican Convention meets at the City Hall, for the purpose of electing delegates to the Philadelphia Convention.

FRATERNAL.—We had a pleasant visit from A. J. Vaughan, Esq., late of the Mountain Messenger, published in Sierra County, California.

THEATER.—This evening will be presented the new play "The Step by Step," a triple Irish jig, and the farce of "As Like as Two Pears."

ALPINE.—Bishop T. J. McCullough, of Alpine, Utah County, arrived to-day by U. S. Mail. He informs us that a substantial rock meeting house and a frame co-operative store are being erected at Alpine, and that although surrounded by mines the people are not neglecting the agricultural interests.

RETURNED.—Elder Thos. G. Winn, of Smithfield, Cache Co., arrived at Ogden on Tuesday evening, from his mission to the East, during which he traveled in Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Connecticut, New York, and other States. He had a pleasant and prosperous time, preaching the gospel to saint and sinner. He found many of his relatives, whose genealogy he was enabled to trace for several generations, and who came originally from England. He was generally well received and he believes much of the prejudice against the Latter-day Saints in many places is giving way. He speaks in high terms of Brother Eadars Howell, President of the Branch at Hyde Park, Pennsylvania. Brother Howell is a prominent and highly respected merchant of that place, very hospitable and liberal towards the Traveling Elders. He would be pleased to receive a line of correspondence from any of the Elders who have visited his house. A number of the Saints in Hyde Park and Williamsburg contemplate gathering the ensuing season.

BACK AGAIN.—Elder James McCullough, of Santa Clara, arrived in this city on his return from his mission to the States, April 3. He traveled chiefly in Texas and was treated kindly by the people among whom he visited. He had not much opportunity to preach in public, but he did a good deal of conversational preaching. The people generally in Texas feel yet the pressure resulting from the civil war, and indeed in some places the people seem to be a very discouraging state of affairs there, the people being sadly oppressed by heavy taxation. They were too much engrossed in political matters to care greatly about religion.

NATURAL CURIOSITIES.—Bro. Thos. G. Winn, just returned from a mission East, has exhibited to us some natural curiosities from the bed of the mighty deep. Among them were various specimens from Long Island Sound of mussel shells, peccotia or scallops, (bivalve, called oysters, (oysters, nerita, etc., fossil-crinoids, echinua, some beautiful specimens of coral (spondylia), from Bermuda. Recently called brain coral, also fan coral, and a nugget of anthracite coal from the mines near Scranton, Pa. Some of the above specimens may find their way to the Museum.

REXWAY.—This morning about nine o'clock a frightened team started from East Temple street and dashed at full speed along First South street. In passing the Theatre they ran against the lamp post in front of that building, breaking lamp and post in pieces. After running eastward several blocks the animals were finally stopped without doing further damage.

PROSPEROUS.—We are informed by Brother Geo. D. Keaton, secretary of the Fifth and Sixth Wards co-operative store, that that institution is in a flourishing condition, a dividend of twenty-five per cent on capital stock invested having been declared at a meeting of the shareholders last evening.

POLICE.—William Van, alias "Big Bill," was before Justice Clinton this morning, charged with assault, with intent to kill, upon John Cunningham, a stevedore. Van's counsel requested time for preparation before the examination was entered upon, which was granted and the case was postponed till to-morrow. His bonds, however, which were yesterday placed at \$500, were increased to \$2,000. Although Cunningham's injuries are somewhat severe, he is doing well and is to be grounded. In default, the prisoner was locked up in the City Jail.

CITY LOT.—The following communication is upon a matter of importance to all owners of lots in this city, and it should receive careful attention.—
 "SALT LAKE CITY, April 4, 1873.
 "Editor: Dear Sir,
 "The time allowed by law for owners of lots, or parts of lots, in Salt Lake City to file their declaratory statements in rapidly drawing to a close. There are many who have not yet filed their claims. Unless those who have neglected this duty intend to do so immediately, it will be next to impossible for the clerk to record the papers as fast as required, especially if the procrastination is continued much longer. Serious difficulty may occur through such unjustifiable negligence and delinquency may have cause to regret it.

 "BEAR LAKE VALLEY.—By courtesy of A. M. Munser, Esq., we are enabled to publish the following extract from a letter to him from Bishop W. Budge, of Paris, Rich County: "The weather is very cold, although generally pleasant, the snow is still deep—about two feet deep on the level, and going away but slowly. We have had at intervals a few warm days, which reduced the snow considerably. The times here are serious, as the feeding of this long winter has now almost used up all kinds (or I should say all qualities) of food, as we have only hay. Half rotten hay finds ready sale. A few warm days would release us, and afford feed on the hills for stock able to find it, but a continuation of frost must assuredly cause great loss; or a snow to cover the bare places on the hills a week or two would prove ruinous. This risk is run by us who live where there is practically an endless amount of hay and feed, and feed on the hills, that although last season was the driest known in this region, there was hay enough left (after the people had done

hauling) or grass to make it (though not of the best kind) to winter all the stock in the valley. Our winter commenced six weeks earlier than usual, and not foreseeing the length or severity, we find ourselves in our present dilemma. I think as a people we have learned a lesson, and will more generally prepare for such a time."
 "Our mail service is no better than formerly, there is no regularity and no certainty as to when letters or papers may come or go; and I have reason to believe that there have been accumulations of back mail until winter at Franklin, in fact our last mail but one brought nothing but old papers, so far as I know. Just imagine our anxiety, in these interesting times, for news by the expected mails and when opened we receive papers dated last Nov. and Dec. Bro. Nelson, the sub-editor, works hard enough, but he cannot, from the pay he has, fill the contract paid for by Government."

PASSED THE SENATE.—A dispatch informs us that a bill granting the right of way for a railroad from this city to Portland, Oregon has passed the Senate.
