



L. D. S. CHAPEL DEDICATED AT NORTHCUTS, TENN.

On Sunday, Oct. 24, the annual conference of the elders and members of the East Tennessee conference was held at Northcuts, Grundy county, and on that occasion the recently completed chapel there was dedicated by President Charles A. Callis. The building was commenced last January. At that time Elder W. K. Soobrig presided over the conference. A building committee was appointed as follows: John H. Tipton, chairman; Beecher Smart, treasurer; Curtis Hobbs, Beecher Smart and W. L. Tanner, the last named being the only member of the Church on the committee. Elder John E. Pickett was transferred from the East Kentucky conference to take charge of the conference work. The dedication was made by Elder Henry Erickson, and Elder Andrew Godwin painted the structure. All the elders in the conference contributed to the building fund. Mr. John H. Tipton donated the site and part of the timber. A few days ago, Brother Tipton was baptized into the Church. The actual cash outlay was relatively small because the studding, sills, sleepers and rafters were supplied by the committee, while cost of the committee experts, were paid out of the ground. The saints and many of our friends at Northcuts and throughout the conference assisted in a substantial manner in erecting the chapel. This house of worship is a beautiful edifice. It is provided with comfortable seats and is neatly finished inside and outside. It has the distinction of being the first church built in Northcutts Cove, which nestles in a beautiful little vale of the Cumberland mountains. The seating capacity of the chapel is 200.

The conference and dedicatory services were largely attended. President and Sister Callis and the traveling elders of the East Tennessee conference and Sister Emma Jensen of the Atlanta conference were present. The discourses of President Callis and the elders were doctrinal and replete with timely counsel. Sisters Callis and Jensen addressed the people on woman's mission in life. Their remarks were well received. The meeting was adjourned and between the meetings the sisters, both members and non-members, served an excellent dinner on the grounds in front of the church.

The old Beech Grove Sunday school is now flourishing in the new church with a membership of nearly 50. Brother Henry Smart, assistant to Supt. W. L. Tanner, is a carpenter of ability and worked faithfully assisting Elder Pickett. Sister Zelma Tipton has charge of the kindergarten department of the church.

Elder W. H. Larson succeeded Elder W. K. Soobrig in the presidency of the East Tennessee conference March 23 of this year. He has worked faithfully and zealously with the people to complete the church. The work of the Lord is making excellent progress in the conference and the elders are united and happy in their ministry.


