### THE LATE MRS. ROBINSON.

Mrs. Robinson had the distinction of he-ing the first white woman to set foot on Plain City soil. She was born in Edin-burgh, Scotland, Dec. 29, 1819, the family afterwards removed to England, where she was married to the late Joseph Rob-inson, Jan. 1, 1843. On Nov. 13, 1847, she became a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Her husband joined the Church the following year. They emigrated to American, reaching Sail Lake City Sept. 22, 1854, They made their home in Lehi until the spring of 1859, when they settled where Plain City stands today. The life of Sister Robinson was filted with good and noble deeds; she was a firm Latter-day Saint. She died Jan. II, 1906, in her eighty-sixth year. Mrs. Robinson had the distinction of he-
