RIDGWAY GOES TO DENVER.

Following the Meeting With Mr. Bancroft He Left City for Home Last Night.

Prior to leaving for Denver last evening, A. C. Ridgway, general manager of the Rio Grande system, General Superintendent A. E. Welby of the Rio Grande Western and other officials, held a conference with Vice President and General Manager W.H. Bancroft at Oregon Short Line headquarters yesterday afternoon regarding trackage arrangements on the west side contemplated under recent franchise granted by the city council in connection with the Western Pacific and Gould improvements here. Just what was the outcome is not at this time forthcoming, but, judging from developments on the coast, if there are concessions made by either side they will be of the give and take order. As was the case when the Salt Lake Route entered the field certain switches and tracks will be conceded eventually by either side before the agreement is arrived at.

Provision, also, is to be made for present and prospective manufactur-ing enterprises, so that neither road will have an undue advantage. In this con-nection the new packing plant for Salt Lake comes under discussion along the lines printed in last night's "News" Both railroads agree that the best way of solving the problem is to construct subway from the Oregon Short Line tracks near the Hot Springs so that caltle unloaded from the cars can be driv-en direct to the yards without trouble or injury.

The

communication from the supervisor follows in full: "I respectfully ask your honorable body to revoke the liquor license is-sued to Fotes & Farros of 557 west Sco-ond South for the following cause, threatening the life of an employe in the city poll tax department, and in-structing the Greek colony in this city not to pay poll tax. The threat and the instructions were made and given in the above mentioned saloon by Pe-ter Fotes, one of the principal partners ter Fotss, one of the principal partners in the saloon business stated, and in consequence my deputies had to aban-don the collection of taxes from the Greek colony, nayment being emphatic-ally refused."

## HOW THE ROW, BEGAN.

It was stated by Councilman Carter It was stated by Councilman Carter that when the poll tax collectors and an interpreter went into the saloon to collect the tax from a number of Greeks, Fotes grabbed a beer bottle and threatened to kill the men and drove them from the place. He also instruct-ed the Greeks that they need not pay their poll tax. The matter was referred to the locense committee and Fotes will be called before the committee to ex-plain his conduct or show cause why their license should not be revoked.
