HARD TO COLLECT RENTS.

State Land Board Has Difficulty in Leasing Under New Rule.

The report of the state board of land commissioners for the fiscal year ending Nov. 30, 1905, has been filed with Gov. Cutler by Secretary John De Gray Dixon. During the year the board held 34 meetings. Of the \$24,000 appropriated for the expenses of the board the sum of \$9,982 was expended during the sum of 39,352 was expended during the year. The report states that the leas-ing of state lands is very unsatisfac-tory, as it is very difficult to collect the rents. The board now requires cash deposits in advance, hence there has been a decrease in the number of leases during the year. The government project in the Straw.

berry valley is mentioned in the report, which states that the project means the expenditure of from \$800,000 to \$1,000.-000, and the redemption of 50,000 acres of land in Utah and adjacent counties.

To the action of the government in setting aside large tracts of land for forest reserves is attributed the decrease in the selection of state lands during the year. The uniform figures for state lands is now fixed at \$2.50 per acre. The total appraisement of state lands at the close of the report was 2,000,945.54 acres of the value of \$3,094,with improvements valued at \$418,621.01.

There were 29,820.26 acres leased dur-ing the year, for \$2,101.41. Total se-lections for the year amounted to 91,-\$92,09 acres. Of these selections for 14,511.92 acres were approved. Lands 14,511.92 acres were approved. Lands aggregating 66,738.04 acres were offered at public auction in Cache, Weber and Utah counties. During the year 43,011.39 acres were sold for \$75,746.82. Sales cov-ering 33,619 acres, worth \$58,848.80, were cancelled during the year. Unsold land Nov. 30, 1905, amounted to 1,959,692.11 acres. Some 500 children re-cited to Mr. Tripp, among whom were ex-Gov, Wells, Hon. John Henry Smith, the mother of Maade Adams, Parley L. Wil Hams, ex-United States Senator Frank J. Cannon, and others. In the spring of 1862, Mr. Tripp went to California, where he worked on the engineering staff of the Southern Facific read; but returned to Sait Lake to remain for two years longer. He continued to teach as before, and calis attention to the fact that his was the first public school opened in the Territory. Mr. Tripp now lives in South Dakota, and was the last chief justice in the Da-kota territory. He represented the gov-ernment on the Samoan Islands, and at Vienna, from 1862 to 1857.
