FOREIGN.

PARIS, 29.—The government has dismissed several mayors for attending masses in memory of Napoleon, and has decided to treat severely all officials participating in Bonapartist demonstrations.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 29.—The report that Midhat Pasha has issued an edict for the disarmament of the population is unfounded. It is stated that the Porte intends to appoint five Christians to be governors of provinces.

LONDON, 30.

Professor Lankester took out a new summons, to-day, against the spiritualist Slade, and Simmons, his assistant, for conspiracy, and also against Slade under the var grant act.

RAGUSA, 30.—The British, German and Italian consuls will proceed to Cetinje, to-day, it is expected, to induce Prince Nicholas to make peace if the Porte will cede to Montenegro. The Turks are allowed to send into Nicholas twelve tons of provisions during February.

PARIS, 30.—The bust of Auber was unveiled with great ceremony, yesterday, over the grave of the composer, in Pere La Chaise.

LONDON, 30.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times, in a letter dated January 22, says the Czar's Moscow speech certainly remains unqualified by any later declaration, but, at the same time, it is evident, judging by the tone of society at St. Petersburg and Moscow, as well as by that of public opinion in general, that this famous speech, although not officially retracted, is virtually withdrawn. The argument adduced by the members of Russian society in justification of this course is that, Europe having interfered and the conference having failed, Russia, notwithstanding what the Emperor said at Moscow, is relieved from individual responsibility. With regard to the preparation of the army in Bessarabia, mobilization has failed, and the army is in anything but a satisfactory condition. Having lived in this country during the whole course of the present crisis, and having carefully watched both here and at Moscow, and hearing the drift of public opinion, I unhesitatingly declare my convictions that the Emperor desires to have an excuse for not going to war.

LONDON, 31.—The Standard's Vienna special says the Porte has dropped its claim for the arrears of the Servian tribute.

Forty thousand volunteers are being collected at Mosul, Asiatic Turkey, to be sent to Kars.

The Standard's Paris special gives an emphatic denial to the report of the retirement of Prince Gortchakoff and the assertion that Russia has given Serbia permission to treat for peace.

Countess Howe, yesterday, threw herself from the window of her mother's residence, in Berkley Square, and died from her injuries. The coroner's jury rendered a verdict that the act was committed while the lady was in an unsound state of mind, caused by grief at the death of Earl Howe, her husband.

There were eighty-six deaths from small-pox last week.

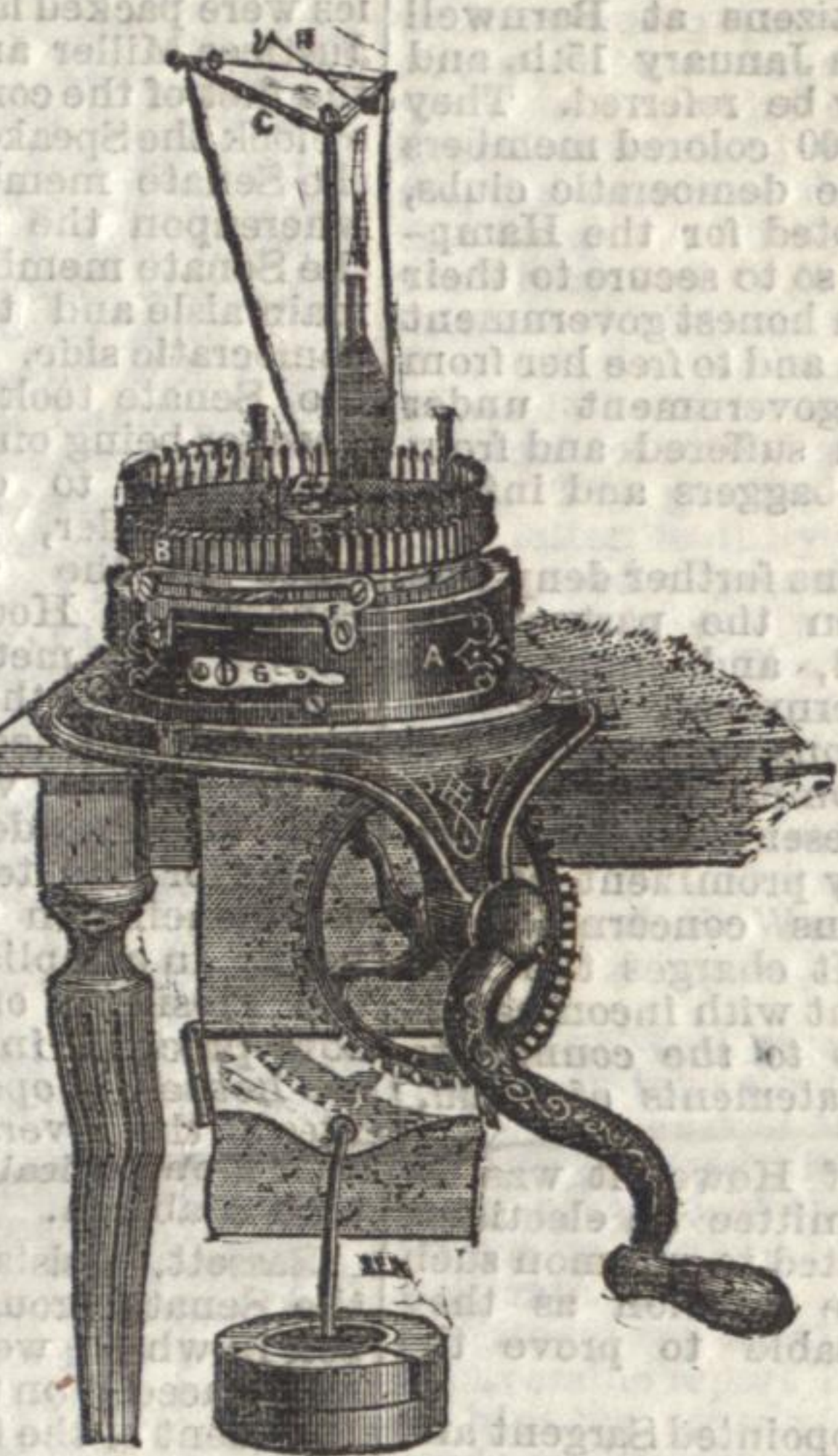

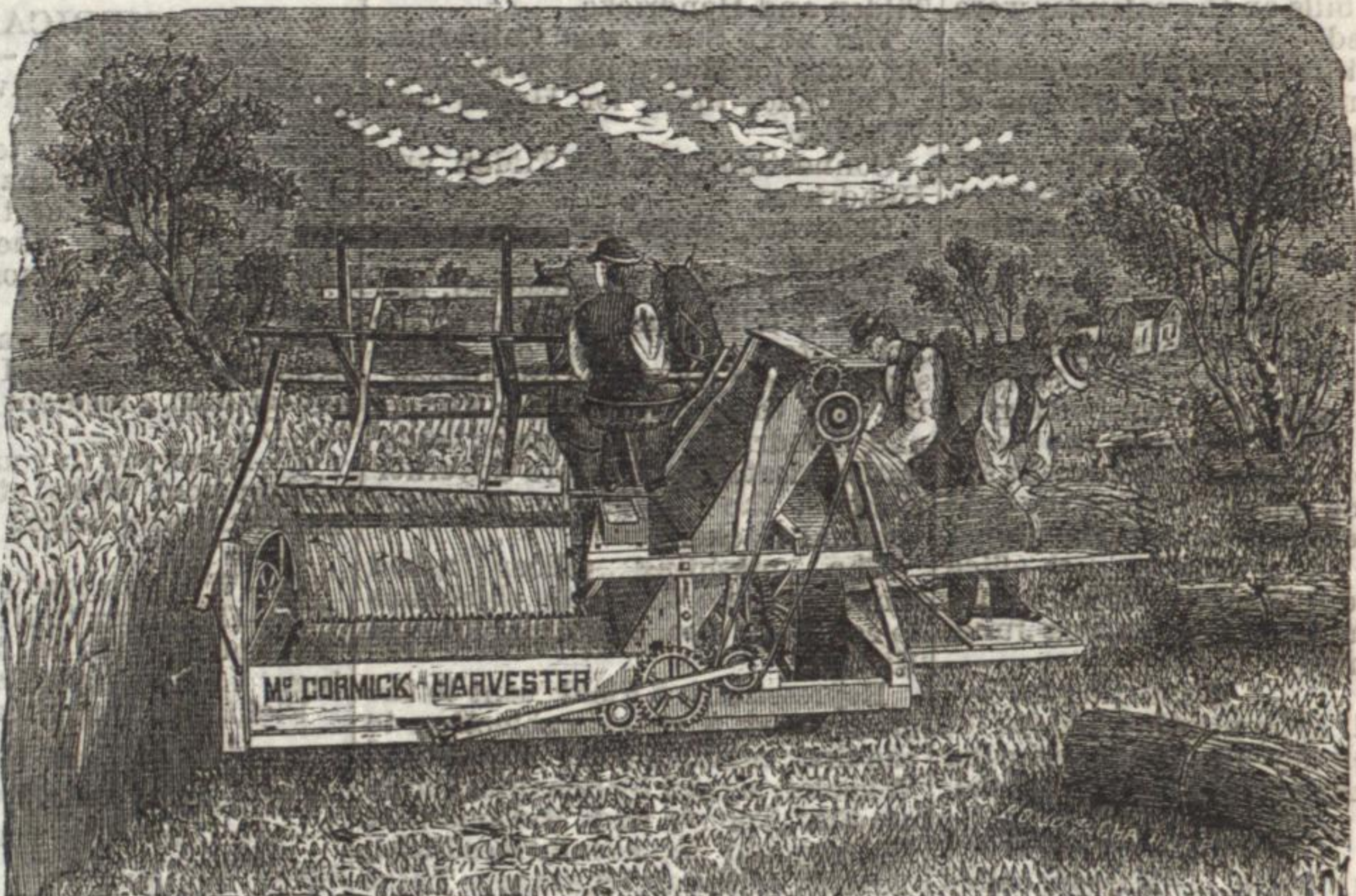
