Miss Jennie Hills and D. M. Danielson of this city were married yesterday by Judge Nielsen.

James E. Smith and Mary Adams, both of this city, were married in the county clerk's office yesterday afternoon by Deputy Clerk Emery.

Mrs. Mary J. Hoge of this city has been granted an \$8 per month pension as a widow of a Mexican and Civil war veteran, Maj. Marion D. Hoge.

Bandmaster Christensen would like to have the members of the Caledonian society listen next Sunday night to "Reminiscences of Scotland" by the First Regiment band.

Thomas Birch was crushed yesterday afternoon by a rock cave in the Grass Creek coal mine near Coalville. He was 20 years old and single. He will be buried at Coalville.

The present season is one of the driest in the history of the local weather office. But then the drought is general throughout the country, so Utah is not the sole sufferer.

Forest Reserve Inspector C. S. Beach of Cheyenne is a guest at the Cullen. He says the present year has been very disastrous to the forest reserves and winter there will be no more trouble.

Editor James Connelly of the Workers' Republic of Dublin speaks tomorrow and Sunday in this city under the auspices of the Socialist Labor party. He is a distinguished and able speaker.

W. S. McCormick is to be the toastmaster at the coming of the opera company. Chairman O'Meara of the committee on arrangements says fully 250 members of the club will "sit down to meat."

General Secretary Cox of the Y. M. C. A. is gone to Colorado Springs in attendance on a convention of the Central West group of Young Men's Christian associations held at Colorado Springs.

As an illustration of the dryness that prevails in R. Savage remarked this morning that he noticed yesterday afternoon in the country that the ground was parched dry for a distance of over one mile.

Rev. Charles D. Crane, president of the Maine state union of Christian Endeavor will be in this city on the 21st, and arrangements are in progress to have him speak before a general meeting while here.

The Elks will observe the first Sunday in December as sorrow day, when the order will pay tribute to the memory of the brethren who have departed this life during the past year. Lodge 85 has lost five this year, and 15 since the establishment of the lodge.

Advices from Samoa indicate that the new headquarters of the Church at Pesea on the island of Upolu, is being finished and dedicated. This locality is much nearer Apia, the capital, than Pagaia, the former headquarters of the mission, and the new building is said to be a very creditable one.

Robert Curry has retired from the position of walking delegate for the Trades unions, and his place is taken by J. D. Hogan of the Lathers' union, who in his official position represents seven labor unions. Mr. Hogan says everything is serene and peaceful as regards strikes—there is no trouble anywhere.

There is a report current in Presbyterian circles that a relative of Andrew Carnegie will interest himself in securing from him a generous donation to build the organ to be erected in the new First Presbyterian church in this city. This will enable the music committee to secure one of the finest instruments in the country.

The special missionaries of the Salt Lake Stake held a meeting in room 25 of the Lion House last night, at which reports were given of the working being done and the success attending the efforts of those engaged. The reports were of a very encouraging character.

REPUBLICANS SWEEP THE STATE

Everything Seems to Have Gone Their Way in Idaho.

LEGISLATIVE MAJORITY 41.

This Means the Election of a Republican House and a Republican Senate.

Reports from Idaho indicate that the Republicans swept the state from one end to the other. The returns, which continue to come in slowly, only tend to swell Republican majorities and it is conceded on all sides that the complexion of the legislature will be 41 Republicans and 13 Democrats, giving the former a majority on joint ballot of 41. This insures the election of a Republican senator, although who it will be is yet an open question. Those mentioned for the place are W. E. Borch, of Boise, Judge D. W. Standard of Pocatello, W. B. Heyburn of Wallace and Senator George L. Shoup.

Below will be found returns from different sections, all indicating that the trend towards Republicanism was general throughout the state.

Boise Republican.

Rebuck, Ida., Nov. 5.—The election passed off here very quietly, although both parties worked for all they were worth, the result being a sweeping victory for the Republicans, as the following returns will show. The total number registered is 543 and the total vote polled, 457.

MRS. WILSON DEAD.

First Woman Resident of Eureka Passes to the Other Side.

Mrs. Prussia P. Wilson, wife of George E. and mother of George A. Wilson, died at the Keogh-Wright hospital in this city this morning. Mrs. Wilson was one of the oldest and most respected residents of Eureka, where she had lived for 22 years. She was the first woman to take up her residence there and was the only woman living there for a period of two years. Her remains are at O'Donnell's undertaking parlor, where they will be shipped this evening to Cheyenne, Wyo., for interment.

CHICKEN THIEF CAUGHT.

Officer Simpson Arrests One at an Early Hour This Morning.

Just before 5 o'clock this morning Officer Simpson observed a man slouching along the streets with something concealed under his coat. The officer decided to investigate and discovered that the fellow was trying to dispose of three chickens which had stolen. After stealing the birds he killed them and tried to sell them to the restaurants. He was looking for a prospective purchaser when Simpson arrested him. The man gave his name as C. A. Scott and made the usual plea in such cases, that the chickens were given to him by a man who wanted them sold. He was looked on the charge of petit larceny and locked up.

THE VOTE IN GARFIELD.

Republicans Carried the County With a Majority of 314.

(Special to the "News.") Panhandle, Nov. 5. Marysville Nov. 7.—Garfield county's vote is as follows:

Escalante, Rep. 55, Dem. 53; Tropic, Rep. 27, Dem. 27; Cannonville, Rep. 27, Dem. 12; Coyote, Rep. 37, Dem. 13; Boulder, Rep. 4, Dem. 16; Henrieville, Rep. 38, Dem. 1. The total Republican majority in this county is 314, the largest ever given.

BARKER BADLY BEATEN.

Three Brothers Start "Rough House" On Commercial Street.

Ed. Joe and J. McKee, three brothers who pose as rough men from the Hole-in-the-wall country, started a rough house in a Commercial street resort last night and did not desert until they had nearly killed Frank Barker, a bartender. The row began in Madge Daniels' resort when the men began to abuse the women. Barker expressed his contempt for men who would engage in such cowardly proceedings and started to leave the place when the brothers took after him. Arming themselves with bricks, one of the men started a billiard ball, which struck Barker on the head, knocking him to the sidewalk unconscious. They then pelted him with bricks and kicked him until he was nearly dead. By that time police officers reached the scene and placed the "terrors" under arrest. Even then they showed fight, but were no match for Salt Lake's finest, and were soon landed in jail. They were charged with assault with deadly weapon.

The names of several witnesses to the fight were taken by the police.

Barker's injuries consist of several cuts on the back of his head, which required many stitches to sew up, and one of his ears was almost torn off.

The arrests were made by Sergeant Hempel and Officer Simpson.

LODGES TO MERGE.

Pioneers of Pacific and Order of Washington Will Consolidate.

The members of the local lodge of Pioneers of the Pacific decided last night, to merge with the Order of Washington, a fraternal organization with headquarters at Portland. The action was effected by Supreme Secretary J. L. Mitchell of the latter organization, and he says that the object of this transfer was to give the members of the Pioneers of the Pacific lodge a stronger organization from which to derive their benefits. Mr. Mitchell states that the Order of Washington has taken in all the Pioneers of the Pacific organizations in Oregon, Idaho, Washington and a greater part of those in Montana.
