A portion of the inhabitants of the quiet suburban village of Highland Park, at Chicago, were suddenly frightened out of their peaceful slumbers, Saturday morning, by the most hideous cries of a panther, and it is supposed that the mutilated body of a man recently found in one of the ravines near there had been the victim of this animal. One man threw all the beefsteak he had out the window and hurriedly ascended his door, while another positively asserts that he had heard the animal prowling around his premises in the latter part of the night.—Ex.

The Amador Ledger, of November 25th, says:

Two or three years ago, Mr. John Dane, while running an open cut for mining purposes, through Grass Valley Ranch, in Amador county, unearthed the skeleton of a mastodon of huge proportions, but most of the bones crumbled to dust after a short exposure to the atmosphere. The remains were found lying in a strata of auriferous gravel with about fourteen feet of alluvial soil over them; but the most remarkable feature of this discovery was that of several stone mortars and pestles, unmistakably the work of human hands, found in the same strata, and in close proximity to the remains of the mastodon, evidently proving that a race of human beings inhabited the mountains of California, co-existent with the mastodon. Mr. Dane has several of these stone mortars and pestles, together with some of the grinders of the huge animal, now in his possession.

Orrin Chase of Contocookville, the man who was mangled at the Northern Railroad shops in Concord, a few weeks since, by being forced on a circular saw by the falling of a pile of wood, is now rapidly recovering and will soon be out. The shock to his system and loss of blood was greater than if he had had both legs amputated; and his recovery is due to his excellent habits and careful medical attendance. At the time of receiving his injuries he was in perfect health, used no rum or tobacco, and a better specimen of man it would be hard to find. Mr. Chase served a long time in the army and was not sick a day. A more wonderful illustration of the recuperative powers of nature is rarely seen.—Patriot.
