BY TELEGRAPH. AMERICAN. EVIDENCES ACCUMULATING THAT CLEVELAND IS ELECTED. DEMOCRATIC CANNON BOOKING ALL OVER THE COUNTRY.

THOUGH REPUBLICANS STILL CLAIM THE VICTORY. DEMOCRATS CALLING FOR A MASS MEETING IN NEW YORK. THE FEELING INTENSE.

FLORIDA. JACKSONVILLE, Fla., 6.—Corrected returns from all the counties in the State show a total of 4,600 majority. Two of the three counties to be heard from are strongly democratic.

INDIANA. COLUMBIAS, 6.—The official vote returns from thirty counties—one-third of the State—give Blaine 7,838; Cleveland 7,812. The remaining counties in 1884 have: Havana, republican, 68,179; Myers, democratic, 67,670.

ILLINOIS. Chicago, 6.—The latest returns to the State indicate the election of 10 republican congressmen and 3 democrats. Doubtful on the State legislative returns, it says that on joint ballot the democrats will have 102, republicans 100, independents 1, and doubtful 1.

MICHIGAN. Detroit, 6.—From reports from 1088 precincts and estimates of remaining precincts the democratic State committee place the republican plurality at about 1,600. The republican State committee claims that the State and electoral tickets are elected by 7,000 majority. All reports received to 10 o'clock indicate Blaine's plurality to be 3,268.

NEW YORK. New York, 6.—Official county returns and very close figures on twelve counties which have not been reported, indicate that Cleveland's plurality reaches nearly 1,000 in the State. Official returns show heavy democratic gains.

NEW JERSEY. Trenton, 6.—Full returns from every county in the State give Cleveland a plurality of 2,018. The State Senate is republican by one vote and the House republican by ten majority.

VIRGINIA. Richmond, 6.—Additional returns from here last night as to Cleveland's majority in the State are not less than 8,000. All the districts but the second and fourth elect democratic congressmen by hand.

WISCONSIN. Milwaukee, 6.—Returns have not yet been received from several of the counties of the State. Cleveland has won by less than 12,000. It is also certain that the republicans have seven out of nine counties and most of the State.

NEW YORK. New York, 6.—The Tribune estimates that Blaine has a plurality in the State of 1,114 votes. The Times says: returns from all but two counties show that Cleveland has a 121 plurality. The Am's revised figures from 99 to 100 counties make Cleveland's plurality 1,385.

NEW YORK. New York, 6.—Chairman Gorham, of the democratic national committee, sent the following dispatch to ex-Gov. Lee, Governor of the State, this morning: "The claim of the national republican committee is laughed at by everybody. We have carried New York beyond a question. At the democratic headquarters the democrats were burning red lights and discharging rockets, and, taken altogether, a wild stirring scene has never been surpassed in the streets of Boston.
