

BURNED DISTRICT OF DESTROYED CITY

Inspection in Automobile Shows
It to be Twenty-Six Miles
In Circumference.

SPRECKELS HOME STANDS.

Is a Blackened Monument to a Great
Disaster: Telegraph Hill Res-
idences Safe.

San Francisco, April 23.—The fire having exhausted itself, with the exception of the still flaming embers in a thousand places here and there through the burned district, the Associated Press, for the purpose of determining with accuracy the boundaries of the conflagration, sent out an automobile today, which skirted the fire on its four sides. The register of this machine at the end of the trip showed that it had traveled 26 miles, which, therefore, may be taken as the length of the line along which the flames traveled.

This area included the financial, commercial and most of the densely populated portion of the residence district, with all the splendid institutions and great mansions that had grown up with the progress of the city.

BEGINNING OF TOUR.

The start of the tour was made from the Pacific Mail dock, at the corner of First and Brannan streets. Traveling along the north line of Brannan, the fire ate its way to Second, where it crossed the street and consumed the warehouse of the great wine firm of Lachman & Jacob at the southeast corner of Brannan and Second. Thence it moved along the west side of Second to Townsend, and along the north line of Townsend to Seventh.

RUINS OF A CHURCH.

And in this connection it is noted that the freight and passenger depots along the southerly side of Townsend street as far east as Third, though built in the worst manner and of the most perishable material, were not so much as scorched. Standing at the corner of Fourth and Townsend streets one's eye caught the ruins of the great brick Catholic church of St. Rose, one block distant, on Brannan near Fourth, which some eight years ago suffered a visitation of fire and had only lately risen on its ruins to what seemed to be imperishable brick and stone.

FIRE ON SEVENTH STREET.

From Townsend, at the corner of Seventh, the fire burned along the east line of Seventh northerly half way to Brannan, where it crossed and burned half the block on the southerly line of Brannan, between Seventh and Eighth. Thence, crossing Brannan, still in a northerly direction, it burned along the east line of Eighth to Bryant, thence along the south line of Bryant half way to Ninth; thence along the north line of Bryant to Juniper, a small street half way distant between Tenth and Eleventh, spurring the northeast corner of Eleventh and Bryant. Thence along the east line of Juniper to Harrison; thence along the east line of Harrison to Eleventh, spurring the northeast corner of Eleventh and Juniper. Thence along the north line of Juniper to Fifteenth, but leaving intact the structure at the northwest corner of Fifteenth and Juniper. Along the north line of Fifteenth it ate its way to Shotwell, and along the west line of Shotwell to Fifteenth; skirting the north line of Fifteenth, it traveled to Howard, and along the line of Howard to Eighteenth, where it again diverged northerly along the north line of Eighteenth as far as Capp, and thence along the west line of Capp.

WIDE MASSES OF RUINS.

In this immediate district it was noted that the block bounded by Seventeenth and Eighteenth and Howard and Shotwell, though spared by the flames, had been terribly shaken by the quake. In some instances the houses were a mass of ruins, it is thought that of all the buildings in that square block the only two that might be saved from the wrecker were those of Lawyer W. C. Williams.

Graves at 2189 Howard. Even the Catholic church of St. Charles, at Shotwell and Eighteenth, appeared to be unsafe. The streets in this vicinity were sunken from six to eight feet in places and the earth opened in great gaps, while the rails of the car system were twisted and broken.

In its progress the conflagration consumed all the dwellings along the west line of Capp to a point half way between Nineteenth and Twentieth to Dolores, at which point it was stayed by the great opening which was formerly the Jewish cemeteries of this city, but which, within a few years, have been purchased by the municipality, and were in progress of being converted into a pleasure ground. Here are camped some of the many thousands who are homeless.

AN INDEPENDENT FIRE.

Before leaving this district it may be mentioned that an independent fire was started Wednesday morning immediately after the tremor, in the dry goods store of Lippman, at the corner of Twenty-second and Mission. This fire burned over an area of 150 by 300 feet, but there being water in the mains at that time, was checked. Traveling northerly on Dolores from Twentieth there was nothing but a waste to be seen on the east line of Dolores, scarcely a vestige remaining of the handsome structure erected by the Sisters of Notre Dame.

CUT DIVERTS FLAMES.

At the northerly end of Dolores, where it meets the extension of Market street, the flames were diverted by the great barren cut at that point, eating easterly, thence along the south line of Clinton park to Guerrero, and along the east line of Guerrero, running in their course the half-constructed hospital of St. Katherine, to Market, where they spread along the southerly side of that thoroughfare easterly to Gough. Thence along the east line of Gough to Page, along the north line of Page, half way to Octavia, spurring the row of buildings along the easterly line of Octavia as far as Fell, where they reached to the easterly line of Octavia, and along the north line of Octavia to where on the west side they were fronted by a half-burned block that had been consumed by a fire started by an over-topped lamp on the morning of the earthquake.

Along the southerly line of McAllister the flames made their way to Gough, stopping long enough to consume the northeast corner of Gough and McAllister. Thence along the easterly line of Gough to Golden Gate avenue, easterly, along the southerly line of Golden Gate avenue to Van Ness, and along the easterly line of Van Ness to Sutter, where they crossed to the west side and burned the blocks from the north line of Sutter and the east line of Franklin through to Clay.

FAMOUS MANSIONS BURNED.

In this district were included some of the most splendid mansions of the city, chief among which was the majestic home of Claus Spreckels, at the southeast corner of Clay and Van Ness. This splendid piece of architecture, done in brownstone in the chateau style, and adorned with all that wealth and taste could gather, still stands, though blackened by the ordeal and divested of all its beauty, a melancholy testimony of the utility of human endeavor.

Still burning along the easterly side of Van Ness, toward Fort Mason, the fire reached Greenwich, along the south line of which it spread to Larkin, and along the east line of Larkin to Lombard. Thence along the south line of Lombard to Hyde, and along the east line of Hyde to Chestnut, easterly, thence along the south line of Chestnut to Taylor; thence along the east line of Taylor to Bay; and down the east side of Mason to the city front.

FROM TELEGRAPH HILL.

One of these was to be seen on the very summit of Telegraph hill, where perhaps a score of homes still stand. At the northwest corner of Jones and Green the residence of O. B. Baldwin, the real estate dealer in the Mills building, is still habitable. Across the city, the northward corner, Mrs. Edward Huber has preserved her home. On a southerly line of Green at 1009 to 1017 are to be found residences of Kirk Harris, George J. Phillips, E. J. Birdsall, William Hanks, Charles O'Brien and Martin Fessler. In this cluster are also the homes of H. P. Livermore, capitalist, on Vallejo between Jones and Taylor; Miss K. M. Atkins, 1022 Broadway; Homer Parker, 1020 Broadway; Eli Sheppard, capitalist, at Vallejo and Taylor; Rev. Joseph Worcester, 1020 Vallejo; Livingston Jenks, northwest corner of Vallejo and Taylor; Thomas Richardson, lumberman, 1022 Vallejo; Morgan Sheppard, 1024 Vallejo; Frank Stone, insurance, 1036 Vallejo; Mrs. Virgil Williams, widow of the artist and of the elder Mr. Folk, father of Willie Folk, the architect. The area also six sets of flats in this vicinity which remain intact. The courageous men and women who saved their homes by main effort while a sea of flames raged and roared about them, in their great thankfulness for the mercy that has been shown them have this small complaint to make: That in their distress they have been quite abandoned by the constituted authorities, and for their protection have organized a patrol system of their own, each man of the number taking a two-hour task of duty.

CALIFORNIA NATIONAL GUARD

Gen. Kaster Defends Its Action
And Gives it the Highest
Praise.

VEVEX BY SPECIAL DEPUTIES.

Feels Great Injustice Has Been Done
By Citizens' Committee Ask-
ing Its Withdrawal.

Oakland, April 23.—In answer to the criticism made of the work of the national guard in San Francisco, Gen. Kaster has issued the following statement:

"Immediately after the earthquake the national guard troops were called out for patrol duty and to render every assistance in their power in the absence of well-defined organization of all the military and police forces, each troop took upon itself the performance of such duty as seemed the most important at that time.

"Since then, however, the city has been restricted between the regular army, the national guard forces and the San Francisco police department. In addition to the performance of regular patrol duty, the national guard has established throughout the district relief stations for the purpose of providing both food and shelter.

"This, in a measure, has reduced the force that might otherwise be available for mere patrol duty.

"Since taking command of the district assigned, no disturbance of any kind has occurred in the national guard's effect, that, in view of the fact that a large number of regular troops are available for patrol duty, it was deemed advisable to request the governor to withdraw the national guard organizations.

"The resolutions are commendatory in tone, but, nevertheless, the officers and members of the national guard feel that it was a slur upon the service, coming as it does in the face of the many complaints which have been made against the organization."

PARADE PRAISES GUARD.

Oakland, April 23.—"No accusations of misconduct on the part of the members of the state militia have been brought to my attention," said Gov. Pardee today, "and I will not believe them until proof is forthcoming."

QUARANTINE ESTABLISHED TO PREVENT SPREAD OF DISEASE

San Francisco, April 23.—Quarantine has been declared here to prevent the spread of cholera, typhoid, diphtheria and fever. The emergency hospitals are unable to care for the hundreds of sick and injured, and Oakland is almost equally overtaxed. It is estimated that 800 have gone insane. Some of them are still wandering the streets.

In one instance the bodies of two Russian Jews who had been killed while stealing, were placed on the wall of a building and conspicuously marked as a warning to thieves. Several men were shot trying to break through the "dead line."

Stern retribution quickly meets all lawlessness, and the troops shoot and investigate without mercy. There is a rumor that Will C. Britt, brother of Jimmy Britt, the pugilist, was shot for refusing to turn his auto over to the authorities when ordered to do so.

CHINATOWN DESTROYED.

San Francisco, April 23.—The big fire has obliterated Chinatown from San Francisco forever. Mayor Schmitz informed Chief of Police Dinkins tonight that all the Chinese now in the city would be collected and placed in and near Fontana's warehouse, near Fort Mason, and that the new Chinatown would be located at Hunter's Point on the southern extremity of the county, on the bay shore. It is several miles distant from the old Chinatown.

WILL SEND CASH FOR BANKS.

Washington, April 23.—Secretary Shaw has given directions that \$1,000,000 of public money be distributed among the National banks of San Francisco and immediate vicinity, which will include Oakland, as soon as the banks furnish necessary securities. The secretary was in Chicago today, and his return is expected here tomorrow.
