OF WORLDWIDE IMPORTANCE.

Such a Divergence in Prices in Gold And Silver Using Countries as to Make Situation Acute.

Washington, Dec. 22 .- Referring to the publication of a letter written by him on the financial question to Sir Moreton Frewen, Senator Teller said today that he had no intention of reviving the silver question, but that his only purpose had been to call attention to the present conditions of exchange between Europe and America on one side and Asia on the other.

"The question of exchange." he said, "is one of world-wide importance, and there has come to be such a divergence between prices in the gold-using and the silver-using countries, that the sit-uation is growing somewhat acute. It who gives the least attention to finan-cial questions must observe it. Hence I make no apology for my reference to it in a personal letter to Mr. Frewen. "I do not see," he continued, "why any of the members of the monetary commission should be astonished at my utterances, as some of them are repre-cented by the asymptotic to have been sented by the newspapers to have been, as my letter did not purport to be writ-ten on behalf of or to express the opin-ion of the commission. One of the negroes upon whose testimony Collins was convicted has since written a book asserting that the testimony of the three negroes at the trial was part of a plan of enemies of young Collins to ruin him by fixing the responsibility for his father's death upon him. The elder Collins was found dead in hed one morning after a visit to his son at Lawrence.

TRANSATLANTIC BALLOON TRIP. Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 23 .- A balloon trip that will attract general attention is being arranged here by George Fisher and George L. Bumbagh. The proposed flight will be across the Atlantic ocean.

The plan is to make the trip in a gigantic balloon, attached to which will be twenty smaller supply balloons, the gas from which may be fed into the large balloon as the leakage makes necessary. Instead of a basket to car-ry the passengers a specially built boat will be used.
