THE LATE JOHN D. EVANS. John D. Evans, who died July 30 from paralysis, was a native of South Wales, having been born March 4. 1843, at Hirwain. Within the next three years John D. made two trips to the Missouri to assist immigrants to Salt Lake valley. In 1881 he joined a Missouri regiment on the side of the Union and fought three years and three months in the civil war, afterwards returning to Utah and settling in Salt Lake City.
