That the quantity of water belonging to American Fork is as follows: From Septem. ber 20th to April 15th, 25-33 parts of the whole of the creek; from April 15th to July 1st, 25-42 parts, and from July 1st to September 20th 20-42 parts, and that plaintiff has regulated the said waters for over twenty years with the consent of the owners of the water and have the right to the exclusive control and management of the distribution of the

vaters. That on the 7th of April, 1900, plaintiff was entitled to receive from the dam in the division of the water 25-33 parts of the whole, and had the locks and gates in the dam so arranged and laced as to divert the portion of said stream to which plaintiff is entitled. That notwithstanding the plaintiff's rights defendant at said time, wrongfully and unlawfully entered upon the said dam and broke and cut away the locks and planks used for diverting to the plaintiff its portion of said stream, diverted from plaintiff and from the canals and ditches through which distributed its water a large portion f the waters to which it was entitled.

Plaintiff asks for a decree, that it has the right to regulate, control and distribute the water, and to be adjudged the owner of the water as above set forth, and for \$50 damages. Defendant answers and affirmatively.

lleges, That for more than forty years has been, and is, charged with the duty of regulating, controlling and dis. tributing the water to which its inhab. itants and persons living in the vicinity of its corporate limits are entitled. That the portion of water, which the

defendant is charged with the duty of regulating and distributing is: parts of the entire flow during the irri-gating season of each and every year, up to the first day of July; and 8-42nd parts from said date, during the remainder of the irrigation season; and sufficient of the said water during all the portions of the year when irrigation is not necessary, to supply the residents of the defendant city with sufficient water for their use for domestic and

culinary purposes. Defendant further alleges that for ten days prior to the commencement of this action, the lands which defendant is charged with the duty of distributing water to for irrigation had been dry and in need of irrigation. That defendant, on the 24th day of March, made a de mand upon the city council of American Fork city for the amount of water to

which it was entitled, to which demand the plaintiff has ever since refused to comply with. That by reason of the refusal of plaintiff to allow defendant to take the portion of the water to which it was entitled, and by reason of being deprived of the water, the persons for whom it acts have been damaged in the sum of \$5,000, for which sum it asks judgment, and to be decreed the owners of the right to regulate and distribute the waters as above claimed. There are a large number of witnesses and the

case will occupy several days.
