Ogden, June 27 .- The members of the Ogden city council vesterday afternoon examined the site for the proposed municipal power plant, Apparently all concerned were satisfied with the proposition and the deal for purchase will be consummated this afternoon or tomorrow. The price is not stated but it is said that it is a little below \$5,000.

The site is located on Willard creek east of Willard, Boxelder county. A pipe line is planned which will be 5,000 feet in length which will have a fall of 1,050 feet in that dis-tance.
