

OPINION VEERING AROUND TO COOK

Scientists and Explorers Agree
That Peary's Findings Con-
firm Cook's Story.

ENGLISH MORE FAVORABLE.

Capt. Amundsen and Dr. Edward
Bay, of Fram Fame, Among
Strongest Supporters.

New York, Sept. 9.—Scientists and explorers here today endorsing the latest dispatches regarding Peary's achievement with the reports which Dr. Cook has sent out, were very generally agreed that Peary's findings seem to confirm Dr. Cook's story in several significant particulars.

"Peary's rapid traveling," said Anthony Falls, "is the most important evidence thus far produced in substantiation of Dr. Cook's claims."

ENGLISH MORE FAVORABLE.

London, Sept. 10.—The immediate effect of the publication of Peary's brief account of his journey here is a revolution of feeling in favor of Dr. Cook and the adoption of a more impartial attitude.

The Daily Telegraph says: "Dr. Cook has decided to face the music and in so doing has greatly increased his position in English eyes and in a large measure has made comment at the present stage both unfair and unwise."

The Morning Post regards the tone adopted by the extreme partisans and says that even Peary's telegram saved of the injudicious.

"Both explorers may, for all we know," says the paper, "be mistaken and until proof is forthcoming must both be considered to stand on an equality so far as the race for the pole is concerned."

One of the chief reasons for the revision in Dr. Cook's favor is the unexpected swiftness of Peary's sledge journey to and from the pole. This is regarded as having disposed of one of the strongest arguments against the probability of Cook's feat and has placed the possibility of arctic travel in an entirely new light.

The Post in a special article suggests that owing to the known difficulty of securing accurate observations for lat-

made in the furthest north and considering the phenomenally rapid rate at which they traveled, both Cook and Peary may have miscalculated their positions.

CAN'T BLUFF COOK

Copenhagen, Sept. 9.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook will sail from Christiania Saturday on board the Scandinavian-American liner Oscar II for New York, where he is due Sept. 20 or 21. Probably Capt. Ronald Amundsen will accompany him. Dr. Cook has abandoned his proposed visit to Brussels on the advice of friends.

Dr. Cook today asked the officials of the Danish Greenland administration to arrange for the dispatch of one of their boats to Greenland at his expense to get the two Eskimoes who accompanied him to the pole. The official said it is now too late for such an attempt, and advised him that he must wait for spring, which he will do. He proposed to Gould Breaker, who is here with his yacht Pedra, that they make a start for Greenland immediately, but Breaker would not agree.

The Copenhagen papers are full of the controversy. Almost all support Dr. Cook's claims, but there is no light on the subject. Capt. Amundsen is one of the strongest supporters of the explorer, who is now backed up by Dr. Edward Bay, the zoologist of the expedition under Capt. Sverdrup in the Fram in 1898-1902. On that expedition Capt. Sverdrup made highly important scientific investigations, and it was over the route mapped by Sverdrup that Cook made his journey northward.

Dr. Bay today had a long interview

with Dr. Cook. At the conclusion of which he said that while at first he had doubted Cook's story, he was now certain of its truth so far as the route claimed to be taken was concerned. Dr. Cook, he said, gave him accurate descriptions of places and things which no other white man except Bay had ever seen.

Dr. Bay asserted that the Danes in Greenland were unfriendly to Commander Peary because they believed he treated the Eskimoes badly and forced them to work for him.

JAPAN DISREGARDS INTERNATIONAL LAW

In the Matter of Killing Fur Bear-
ing Animals. Declares Dr.
David Starr Jordan.

ACTION AN UNCIVILIZED ONE.

Affront to American Civilization—
Solution of Trouble is In-
ternational Game Law.

San Francisco, Sept. 10.—"The Japanese have disregarded every international law in regard to the killing of fur bearing animals."

This statement was made yesterday by Dr. David Starr Jordan, president of Leland Stanford, Jr., university in an address delivered at the closing session of the annual convention of the State Humane Association of California. Among other things Dr. Jordan said was:

"Japan's action is an uncivilized one. I would not say that Japan is an uncivilized nation, but its attitude in regard to the killing of seals has been one of the greatest affronts offered to American civilization. The bounty offered by the Japanese of \$10 a head for fur-bearing seal caught or killed is an uncivilized act. They have violated repeatedly the international law which forbids them to hunt or kill seals within 60 miles of the islands."

President Jordan offered as a solution of the difficulty an international game law which would prevent the robbery of these animals who can never be restored.

CURTISS WILL TAKE
PART IN CELEBRATION.

New York, Sept. 10.—Definite word has been received from Glenn H. Curtiss, the American aviator now participating in an international contest at Brescia, Italy, that he will surely take part in the Hudson-Fulton celebration in this city. Wilbur Wright will also participate.

Incidentally, it will be the first time that an airplane, outside of a dirigible balloon, has sailed over New York City, and the interest already is intense. The flying machine will start and land on Governor's island in the upper bay, and the contract with Wright and Curtiss calls for a number of flights over the city and up and down the Hudson river.

ANIMALS OF FOREIGN
ORIGIN HAVE RIGHT OF WAY

Washington, Sept. 10.—The curious situation of animals of foreign origin having right of way over livestock of domestic origin is given in a decision just made by the treasury department acting under a provision of the new tariff laws.

The department holds that animals of domestic origin taken abroad for temporary exhibition by a circus or menagerie are entitled to free entry upon their return to his country, although such animals, if of foreign origin, may be admitted free of duty if exported in accordance with the customs regulations.

Acting Secy of the Treasury Reynolds has notified the collector of customs at Port Townsend, Wash., who telegraphed an inquiry.

The law had been amended to include the free entry privilege of animals along with domestic ones, but the new tariff law bears a prohibitory provision replacing the paragraph which gave free entry to the domestic animals and thus leaves the foreign livestock taken abroad for a circus exhibition as the only ones entitled to come into this country free.

BOLIVIA NOT LEFT OUT
OF CONFERENCE.

Washington, Sept. 10.—There is no probability that Bolivia will be left out of the pan-American conference to be held in 1910.

United States Minister Sherill, at

Buenos Ayres, has telegraphed the state department that some time ago the Argentine government, after having received the pan-American program issued invitations to the fourth pan-American conference which is to be held at Buenos Ayres in 1910, but that owing to the absence of diplomatic representation of either government at the capital of the other, Argentina was unable at that time to convey an invitation to Bolivia.

It is stated by the officials in Washington, that the boundary dispute between these two countries will not be allowed to interfere with Bolivia's representation at the conference, and if Argentina is not able to extend the invitation to Bolivia some other means of transmission satisfactory to all concerned will undoubtedly be found.
