THE ECLIPSE TO-MORROW. - The eclipse of the sun to-morrow is one of the most interesting astronomical facts of the century, and will command the attention and suspend the avocations of many millions of human beings. It will be visible, though not total in every part of North America, completely hiding the orb of day from a belt of country of more than 150 miles in The credit system which has beretofore prebreadth, running in a northwest to a southeast direction, nearly through the middle of the United States, moving eastward at the rate of 2,221 miles per hour. The actual time occupied in the passage of the moon across the sun's disc will be two hours and a half, but the apparent time as measured by the clocks at the places of beginning and ending will be 14 hours and 10 minutes. The eclipse will be total in Montana, but not in Utah, as we lie beyond the southern edge of the line of totality, yet in our most northern settlements it will be very nearly total. In the vicinity of this city the eclipse will commence about two o'clock in the afterneon, and will not be over for very nearly two hours. If the day be unclouded the darkness will be great, but should the day be cloudy the amount of reflected light will make a considerable


