BOISE BANKERS PLAYING SAFE

Clearing House Ass'n Formed as a Precautionary Measure, To Report Weekly.

ENCAMPMENT OF MILITIAMEN

A Uniform System of Accounting to be Inaugurated by Idaho County Auditors.

BOISE, Id., Oct. 31.—Although there is not the slightest change in the banking business of Boise City, due to the disturbed financial condition throughout the country, yet the local bankers are enacting earnest precautionary measures toward avoiding trouble or relieving distress if it does happen to come.

The first three days of the week the bankers of the city met to consider the proposition of organizing a clearing house association, and yesterday succeeded in bringing to pass a complete organization, which is to be known as the Boise Clearing House association. F. E. Coffin was elected president; L. A. Coate, secretary, and W. L. Bear, manager. It is the intention of the association to make a clearing each week from now on. The association reports that there is absolutely no need for alarm, in regard to local money matters. The banks have plenty of money and they now have affairs so well in hand that they can meet most any emergency.

ON INSPECTION TRIP.

Twenty-three officials of the different divisions of the Oregon Short Line Railroad company arrived in this city at 12 o'clock yesterday evening, on their annual inspection of the roads, and the company are being inspected in every detail. The party visited the Natatorium as soon as it arrived, where all the members took a plunge, then, after supper, went to the Orpheum theater. Then the train pulled out of Boise at 10 o'clock last night for Shoshone. An inspection of the Woodriver branch will be made today.

IN CAMP AT BOISE.

Yesterday two companies of militiamen from Weiser and Cambridge arrived in the city under command of Maj. Robert Lansdon, to enter upon a 10 days' encampment here. They proceeded direct to the Boss's barracks where tents were pitched and encampment rules went into effect. Other companies are expected today.

COUNTY AUDITORS TO MEET.

Arrangements are being made to call a meeting of the auditors of the 23 counties of the state, to be held in this city Nov. 20 and 21. The object of the convention is to standardize among the counties a uniform method of record keeping and to discuss ways of improvement in the keeping of the county books, issuing reports, etc. The convention has met with the hearty approval of Gov. Gooding and will come through the offices of the state accountant, G. D. Gossett.

FLOW OF HOT WATER.

Herbert and Perkins, who have been drilling for an artesian flow of hot water in a small tract of land back of the Sunbeam Inn, were rewarded Tuesday morning by striking a subterranean current which carried a temperature of 145 degrees. The pipe has been driven a depth of but little less than 1,000 feet when the flow was reached. The flow is regular, though the pipe is small. Another well, much larger, will be driven right away in an effort to materially increase the present flow.
