An amusing episode occurred in one
of the Kingston Churches on Sunday
last. Owing to the absence of the
minister a lay member of the congrega-
tion was invited to read a sermon at the
morning service, which he did very
acceptably to those present. In the
afternoon a clergyman from a neighbor-
ing place occupied the pulpit and
preached a sermon. Oddly enough it
happened to be the very identical ser-
mon which the lay member had read in
the morning. The congregation was
thus enabled to compare two different
styles of delivery.
A new stone dressing machine in
operation at Worcester, Mass., makes
the pieces of stone dress each other, as-
sisted by sand and water. The action
of the machine imparts a double mo-
tion, lateral and rotary, to the stone,
and thus secures a surface of perfect
uniformity. Tried upon Uxbridge and
Fitzwilliam granite, pudding stone and
various other kinds, hard and soft, this
machine has been thoroughly success-
ful, and not only dresses the stone in
the most perfect manner, but can ac-
complish ten to twenty times as much
work in a given time as can be done by
hand.
The first bank established was in
Italy, A.D. 808, by the Jews of Lomb-
ardy, many of whom settled in Lomb-
ard street, London, where many bank-
ers now do business, making it, in some
respects, to that city what Wall street
is to New York. The word "bank"
originally meant "a bench or table," in
allusion to those on which the money-
brokers transacted business, and corre-
sponding with the word "counter" of
our own day. The mint of the Tower of
London, however, was an anciently the
place where merchants deposited their
money, until Charles the First laid
hands upon it, and thus destroyed its
credit. Being thus forced to find some
other place of security for their funds,
which excited robbery, and the pecu-
lation of their apprentices, when kept at
home, they agreed, in 1645, to deposit
their money with the goldsmiths of Lombard
street, who were provided with strong
boxes for the security of their own valu-
able wares, and this was the origin of
the banking system in England.
W. C. Bryant, speaking of newspa-
pers, says:
"Books are the precious metals in mas-
ses—newspapers coin them for general
use, put them into the most convenient
forms, and pass them from hand to
hand.
"Newspapers" he said "are the ushers
of books. Who would know when a
book is published, but for the friendly
information of the newspaper?"
He adds, "that he had been some-
times tempted to regret that the wise,
witty, or eloquent things which appear-
ed in the 'folio of four pages' as they
were called by Cowper, should not be
inserted on more durable tablets, in-
stead of going the next morning to wrap
parcels or light kitchen fires; but he was
fully satisfied with their fate when he
reflected, that they had first been read
by thousands, and whatever was good
in them had passed into the general
mind."
