PREPARED TO FIGHT.

Subscribers at Constantinople Hold
a Conference.

AND LAY A PLAN FOR PROTECTION.

The War Ships of the Powers to Be in
Readiness in Case They
Should be Needed.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 15.—(Cablegram, 1896, by the Associated Press.)—The ambassadors of the powers held a meeting today to lay out a plan for measures of protection of the different embassies and the foreign population generally in the event of the renewal of disturbances here. The plan is understood to include united action of the warships of all the powers, each ship being assigned to a certain position and men to be landed at a given signal to protect the embassies. The number of the embassies will also be increased by the increase of the number of men to guard them and by other precautions which will tend to make them capable of resisting an attack for a considerable time. It was also reported that in possible case of a renewal of disturbances the warships of the powers will reinforce the garrisons now doing duty in these waters.

LESS THAN ESTIMATED.

Critical Returns from Arkansas Re-
duce State's Majority.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 15.—Offices, houses from sixty-five out of one hundred counties in the state were closed yesterday, and the total vote, 10,227, was added to 10,496, giving a majority of 1,171. He had for twelve years been on the front rank, lay down on the grass, and blow out his brains. The wretchedness to be married, and her lover was in the room, was the cause of his suicide. It is reported that his mother was present, she did not wish to become a burden to any one. Her mother is a widow.

PREPARING FOR THE WINTER.

Legislation Prepared to Make Canada
Police Payable in Gold.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—A special to the Times-Herald from Ottawa, Ont., says: In the Senate last night Sir Oliver Mowat, premier of Ontario, told the government, in view of the silver party being dominant in the rear, that he would not increase the amount of the public debt, but that the Canadian silver bankers in American companies will be protected by compelling the payment of such persons in gold, so that after the election we will have no debts if necessary. The amount of life policies held in American companies in Canada is \$10,000,000, in fire companies \$10,000,000, and in bank companies \$1,000,000. As a result of the new legislation, the Canadian companies, the government has a bill before it for \$17,000,000, belonging to such companies, held and invested by them in Canada.

Canadian silver companies have consented to increase their rates payable in gold, while other companies have refused and will fight the question.

Fatal accident.

BERGEN, Sept. 15.—Owing to the collapse of a gateway leading to the Bueren, forty-five persons were thrown in the Rhine. Three were drowned. One was pulled out of the water in a critical condition. It is stated that several others were drowned.

CLEARING THE SAME FROM A Decision Preserving the West Park to the People of Chicago.

CHICAGO, Sept. 15.—By a decision of Judge Brumley, the second regimental trial officer, D. armistice must be removed from the Lake front which has been vigorously waged by Minister Ward to keep the lake front in the hands of the city. The city and the Illinois Central railroad company and any one else must be encroaching upon or in any manner encroaching upon the lake front for any purpose whatever. The decision is a victory to the people of Chicago.

This decree also makes permanent the preliminary injunction which Mr. Ward obtained two years ago, restraining the city from dumping street sweepings into the lake front or letting the groups for storage or for other purposes or hire, thus clearly establishing the right of the public in the heart of the city. The name of the judgment is to the decision the property is to be the canal commissioners and to be used by the United States government. This, however, is the first time the powers and permanent injunctions have been so definitely fixed and settled to what use the land as delineated shall be put.

Under this decision the people of

Chicago have a visible park from Bunker Hill to Park Row.

In making the decision, Judge Brumley said that the decision of the United States Supreme Court in what is known as the Lake Front case, which was decided in 1882, the principal question involved was whether with the Art Canal containing water it does not such a structure as should be placed in a park, being of an unnatural nature.
