**CLEARING MONTELO WRECK.**

Another Victim Found Under Debris—  
Death Claims Little Cecil Banford—  
Will Enforce School Attendance.

Ogden, Nov. 19.—Robert S. Campbell, the retiring general manager of the Light & Railway company, who has always been a friend to the employees of the company in all of its departments, was presented Saturday afternoon with a handsome loving cup, as a token of their esteem for him and his excellent services. Mr. Campbell came to Ogden on other business and called at the Light company's office, and was greatly surprised when the employees assembled in the manager's office, and local Manager E. W. Wade in behalf of the employees made the presentation, expressing the kindly feeling felt by all towards Mr. Campbell, and wishing him every possible success in his future life.

The gift is a beautiful silver mounted cup, designed by J. S. Lewis & Co., the local jewellers. It stands 10 inches high, has seven inches in diameter and is solid lined. On one side is the inscription "Robert S. Campbell, November 15, 1906," and on the other side is engraved, "Presented by the employees of the Ogden division of the Utah Light & Railway company, as a token of our appreciation of your kindness to us, and your interest in our behalf during your regime as general manager."

Mr. Campbell was so overcome with emotion that it was hard for him to express his appreciation.

## ANOTHER VICTIM OF WRECK.

Body of Tramp Recovered From Debris at Montello.

Ogden, Nov. 19.—The work of clearing up the wreckage at Montello, Nev., from Thursday's wreck is about completed. Trainmaster Wright, who was in the scene of the disaster immediately on receiving a message, returned home Saturday afternoon. He reports that the company's loss will reach about \$2,000. Twenty-five cars loaded with different kinds of merchandise were piled together in a heap and the contents of the same were scattered for some distance. The two engines were badly demolished. Beneath the debris of the cars was found the head and body of a man, whom it is supposed was the tramp who asked permission to ride on the train and assist in firing the engine. He was the only person on the train who could not be located after the wreck.

Business losses, who suffered serious and internal injuries, is still unconscious at the hospital, and until he regains consciousness the exact cause of the wreck will not be known. The other victims of the affair are recovering very satisfactorily at the hospital.

## DEATH ENDS HIS SUFFERINGS.

Little Cecil Banford Succumbs to Terrible Injury.

Ogden, Nov. 19.—Death claimed Cecil Banford, five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Banford, yesterday morning at the family residence, 3915 Adams avenue, after two days of suffering. Cecil was the little boy who was crushed Friday evening by a Southern Pacific switch engine at the foot of Twenty-second street, while attempting to cross over the tracks to the Southern Pacific shops, where his father was employed. The physicians amputated his foot and tried to save his life but the loss of blood and severe shock to his nervous system was more than he could survive and death came as a great relief. He was a unusually bright little boy and his death brings great sorrow to his parents. The time and place of funeral will be announced later.

## WILL ENFORCE SCHOOL LAW.

Board Will Compel Attendance of All School Children.

Ogden, Nov. 19.—The Weber county board of education has decided to enforce the compulsory school law, also to see that truants are punished. It appears there are a large number of boys and girls throughout the county who attend the school at all times, and that a number of boys are running away from school.
