#### Returning to This City from Mexico He Talks in El Paso.

## (Special to the "News.")

El Paso, Tex., July 15.-Anthony W. Ivins, for many years a prominent Church official in the affairs of the Lat-

ter-day Saints in Mexico, passed through here today en route to Sait Lake City. Mr. Ivins is returning from Casas Grandes, where he was during the revolutionary uprisings. The stories told of the affair from the revo-lutionary standard are confirmed by lutionary standpoint are confirmed by Mr. Ivins. There is considerable un-easiness in the section yet, said Mr. Ivins today, but the opinion is general that affairs are well on the way to settlement. According to Mr. Ivins, the revolutionists were taken before a judge for trial and denied representa-tion by counsel. Their statements Judge for trial and denied representa-tion by counsel. Their statements were taken and sentences pronounced and sent to a higher court for confirm-ation. Mr. Ivins is of the opinion that while many revolutionists were made prisoners by the government, there were, too, many innocent persons whose fates are now in the hands of the high court at Chinuahua. Unarmed Mormons, says ar, ivins, were ordered by the government to ride through the mountains searching for revolutionists, while the armed caval-ry at Casas Grandes was held to guard purposes prisoners.
