City Council Will Purchase Stock of Present Company and Control the System.

City council met in regular session last evening and transacted the following business:

The proposition to advertise for sprinkling bids was laid over for an-The resolution to build waterworks

and instructing the engineer to prepare plans and specifications was also ald over for another week. Judge A. B. Patton was given the freedom of the floor and verbally pre-

sented a petition for police protection in the east part of the city and suggested the name of Wm. Sullivan as proper man for an officer. The committees on fire and public undings and grounds asked the privplege of expending the money received insurance companies on the ad-

justment in the fire loss on the fire stathe request was granted. the request was granted.

The committee on public building and grounds asked for the privilege of advertising for bids to paint the Lester Park pavillon, and the request was

The special committee appointed to see if any second hand sprinklers of any value could be purchased at Salt Lake City reported unfavorably on the prop-osition, and recommended that the city purchase three new sprinklers. The reort was adopted.

The special committee which had been appointed to investigate the waerworks question filed the following TO PURCHASE CONTROL OF WATERWORKS.

Your special committee appointed to nvestigate the waterworks question respectfully report that we have re-

company as follows: The stockholders of said water company offer to sell their entire stock in company to the city for the sum 50,000, which sum will include the ydrant rental since the present company assumed charge, Sept. 1, 1900. Said stock will be subject to the lien created by \$400,000, bonds given by the present company at the time of the pur-chase of the waterworks by them. The ownership of said stock will give possession of the conduit, reservoir and stributive system of the Ogden wa-

Since this proposition was made to ur committee we concluded that it vas but a part of wisdom to ascertain the sentiment of our advisory commiton waterworks and therefore tended a meeting of said committee called by the chairman this afternoon. The matter was there presented. It was unanimously voted that this was the best proposition that had come before the council on the waterworks

We. your committee, have thoroughly considered the matter and have con-cluded that it would be a wise move to ccept this proposition and therefore recommend its adoption, and further we recommend that your committee be empowered to complete the negotiations and the necessary transfer.

We further recommend that the sum of \$40,000 be transfered from the general fund to sinking fund No. 1, and that the city treasurer be so instructed. We further recommend that the sum of \$30,000 be paid to David Eccles for the entire stock in the present water company, and that the city auditor be, and she is herewith authorized to draw warrant in his favor on sinking fund

In connection with this report communication was read from John V. Bluth, secretary of the advisory com-mittee on waterworks, informing—the ouncil that at a meeting of said com-nities held that day the resolution had sen adopted advising the city council to adopt the proposition embodied the report of the committee.

Considerable discussion arose but cuncilman Jones was the only memer who spoke against the proposition s he did not believe it would redound o the city's benefit.
