# IN BRISTOL DISTRICT.

In the Bristol district, situated about 20 miles north of Ploche, several other very interesting groups of mines are lo-cated; among them being the Bristol, in which a sensational strike of copper in which a sensational strike of copper ore was made last year by some leasers. Ore from this lease is now being shipped and a contract was let only re-cently for hauling 2,000 ions to Mo-dena, a station on the main line of the San Pedro. Los Angeles & Sait Lake railroad. 60 miles away, for shipment to the Sait Lake smelters. The Utah-Nevada company, owner of the Jack Rabbit mine at Bristol, has developed a very large tonnage of ore at the lat-Nevan company, owner to the state Rabbit mine at Bristol, has developed a very large tonnage of ore at the lat-ter property and has suspended opera-tions pending the completion of the rail-road. The company operates a narrow gaged road between the mine and Pi-oche which will be later utilized for ore traffic. The Ida May group, recently bonded to W. A.
