Upon inquiry in regard to this man I was informed that he had been crazy three weeks and had been taken away for medical treatment. A passage in the prophecies of Isaiah is forced on my mind: "No weapon that is formed against thee shall prosper and every tongue that shall rise against thee in indement thou shalt condemn. (Is. 54, IT.)

The Elders of the Indiana Conference are active in their labors. They receive a great deal of abuse and our circumstances sometimes are very humiliating to our proud natures, but I have heard none complain. All rejoice in their mission and feel that we have the prayers of the Saints.






