## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**WEATHER ITEM.**—The highest point reached by the thermometer to-day was 90°.

**THEATRE.**—Another good house greeted the second performance of the Japanese troupe last night. **A CORRECTION.**—We have received the following notice, which we take pleasure in publishing:

Indianapolis, Oct. 19, 1871.

To the Press: A statement purporting to be a telegram from this city, published in some newspapers west of St. Louis, and perhaps elsewhere, to the effect that W. G. English, the wealthiest man in Indianapolis, contributed but one dollar to the Chicago relief fund, is not correct. There is no wealthy man of that name in Indianapolis. W. H. The individual contributions here aggregate nearly \$30,000, besides \$5,000 in supplies and \$20,000 by the City Council.

**GOOD FOR THE BISHOP.**—The song says, "let us speak of all the best we can," and that is exactly what we delight to do. It therefore gives us pleasure to insert the following from the Omaha Herald:

Sense.—Bishop Tuttle, of Utah, is reported as having expressed the belief that Brigham Young is "a wise man," and also that Mormonism will not die while he lives. The former fact everybody knew before; that Bishop Tuttle should assert the latter shows him to be a man of sense and observation, and that he is not afraid to shake popular ignorance of affairs in Utah by telling the truth about them as he understands it.

**DIAMETRICALLY OPPOSITE.**—The telegram in another column, stating that the ladies of Utah had forwarded a fifty-five petition to the Executive Mansion, Washington, in opposition to polygamy, and saying that measures be instituted for its suppression, is, we presume incorrect. A petition was signed by the ladies of Utah and forwarded to Mr. Grant, praying him to use his influence with President Grant against the crusade that is being waged to the injury of the people.

**ACCIDENT.**—Yesterday some scaffolding in front of the building in course of erection on the corner east of the Townsend House gave way. Two men, who were on the staging at the time, and who were engaged in lathing, were precipitated a considerable distance. One of them received some slight injuries in one of his arms, and the other had the bridge of his nose broken. We did not learn the names of the men. Both had only recently arrived from California.

**DYING.**—An exchange says of the New York woman's paper:

The Revolution, after an eccentric and checkered career, is at last in the agonies of death. On the return from Europe of Mrs. Bullard, its editor, the question was raised relative to the wisdom of permitting the paper to perish, and it was decided that there was no help for it, and that it must therefore die. It is rather sad to know that Susan B. Anthony's only child should perish, and all from the want of proper nursing.

The Chicago Times comes to hand again, not after the deluge but from the "marital law" in the South, and says that not even Governor Scott, of S. C., is in favor of it. Of the Chicago people the Times says:

How it Looks to Theodore.—Tilton's Golden Age says, "It really looks as though the corner-stone of Mormonism, as an institution, would be overturned." So it has been looked to those who judge by appearance.

The following dispatch was received by W. U. T., to-day:

OPHEE, East Canyon, Oct. 25.—Joseph Flax was shot on the street, in this place, today, at 11:30 a.m., by Robert Meller. He is probably fatally injured, the ball, from a Colt's navy pistol, having entered his right breast, a little below the collar bone.

Meller and Flax had been disputing freely together, and no apparent quarrel existed at the time between them. Meller demanded of Flax a knife, which the latter was carrying. Flax declined to give it him, when Meller, standing close in front of him, cocked and pointed his revolver at Flax. The weapon was struck by an outside party, who supposed Meller was merely trifling. A moment later the pistol was again pointed and fired. Flax is very low. Meller is under arrest.

How is It?—A gentleman of the legal profession made a statement last week, in the Alderman's Court, to the effect that questions would shortly arise that threatened the incorporation of the Corporation of this city.

We do not know whether the gentleman alluded to is inside the "ring," or not; we suppose, for his own sake, however, who might not be considered inside of the circle, who are considerably posted with regard to the questions and doings of that notorious clique.

The public are well aware that some parties would be exceedingly pleased to see the municipality overwhelmed, and that the efforts to be made to prevent this, for some time, inclined in that direction.

In view of the number of individuals springing up here and there in the city, trying on business in defiance of the city ordinances, refusing to pay license, whether they should be pleased to have a similar opinion to that expressed yesterday by Mr. De Wolf, in the Alderman's Court, that "the sooner this matter is settled the better for all parties concerned."

There is a question involved in this matter of which we should be pleased to have an immediate solution: If, under the present free flag of America, municipal corporations are to be ignored by any class of citizens to do so, and such law defiers are sustained by high officials, where is the heavy driving to be? But it would not be possible for the public to consider the country free for the actions of a few of her unprincipled demagogues. Let us see what the country should do to prevent the unjust character of those placed in authority from the laws, the official decisions and appointments of such maladministration should at once follow.

**MORE CIVIL CLASH.**—Last evening the following persons appeared before Jeter Clinton, Alderman and Ex-officio Justice of the Peace, being respectively charged with selling liquor without license: Tucker & McKim, Charles A. Loomis, and James Turbette. The cases were three in number. Mr. De Wolf acting as counsel for the defense in each.

The defense went through the usual and now fashionable performance of taking exceptions to the jurisdiction of the court. The charge in each case was fully sustained, and notice was given of appeals by the defendants, to the District Court of the Territory.

In carrying the defense in those cases through the court the course of Mr. De Wolf was very sensible in one particular—his remarks were very brief.
