





The Backbone of the Boycott Broken -The Embargo Raised by the Kuights of Labor.

GALVESTON, 8.-At the request of the Executive Committee of the Knights of Labor, the citizens' committee again met them in conference at 10 o'clock this morning. The executive commit-tee proposed to submit the grievance against Mallory to a committee of ar-bitration to be composed of five Knights of Labor and five citizens. 
