Dr. Millsap has accepted the presidency of the Los Angeles Normal school, and will remove from Minnesota to southern California in July.

James W. Allred was brought up from Maryvale last evening, and taken to the Keogh-Wright hospital. He was caught in a cave-in at the Log Cabin mine.

The Utah Beekkeepers will hold their annual convention next Tuesday in the mayor's office. The convention will consider exhibits at the St. Louis and Portland fairs.

Miss Bell Inlay, formerly a resident of this city, and lately of San Francisco, is dead, after a long illness, at the age of 29. Her mother is still living in this city.

James Russell was brought to the Keogh-Wright hospital last night from Argentina, Utah, where he had an arm badly injured by being caught in the timbers of the Maxfield mine.

Principal E. S. Hallock of the Franklin school will speak on hoodlums, his causes and its remedies, before tomorrow's meeting of the city school principals in the city and county building.

Manager A. H. May of the Western Union office at Lincoln, Neb., has been transferred to this city, to succeed Manager Moore, resigned, and is now in charge. Mr. May has been with the company 12 years, beginning as a messenger boy.

Giovanni Ferryotto fired three revolver shots at Joseph Filippini in a D. & R. G. construction car last night. The trouble was over a game of cards, in which Giovanni was the loser. His intentions were good, but his aim was bad, and all the damage done to Jose was the perforation of his hat. The police are in hot pursuit of Giovanni.

A committee of churchmen in New York makes an appeal for funds with which to build the proposed Nurses' Home in connection with St. Mark's hospital, as a memorial to the late Bishop Leonard. The members of the committee include: Bishop Ethelbert Talbot of Pennsylvania, Bishop George Worthington of Nebraska, Rev. Ran. dolph H. McKim, Rev. George McC. Pike, Leslie Pell-Clarke and George Gordon King of New York.

Former Lieut. Melville Menden of the Russian army is a guest at the Wilson. He believes that only a miracle can save Japan from annihilation by the Russian forces; and says that the sole reason of the initial successes of the Japanese was in their making a strike when Russia was not ready. Lieut. Menden says the Russians are steadily drawing the Japanese further inland, where they will be coralled and done up.

The interior department has sent out a circular notice to the effect that individuals or corporations proposing to build irrigation canals or reservoirs on public lands or forest reserves must first secure permission for right of way from the department, or suffer prosecution. Where the contemplated project does not exceed five acres in extent or the canal a mile in length, application may be made to the forest supervisor, and for larger projects it should be made through the local land office.

A South State street resident recently built a gravel walk from his curbstone to the street railway track, so as to save his family and immediate neighbors from being forced to walk a long distance to avoid the deep mud in reaching the cars. But to and behold, along comes a county road official, who notifies the maker of the improvement that his gravel walk is an obstruction (saying nothing of the mud) and de liberately hauls the gravel away, making the spot worse than it was before.

Mrs. E. E. Shepard, Miss Grace M. Heikes and R. J. Jessup have been elected delegates to the coming Evangelical Young People's convention of the state, to be held in this city Friday and Saturday next, to represent the State Prison society of Christian Endeavor. In some states, immediate members of prison Endeavor societies are allowed to attend state conventions, but in Utah the representation can only be through the prison committee of the state Endeavor. The Friday night meeting has been changed from the First Congregational church to the First Presbyterian church, and Saturday's proceedings will all be held in the First Methodist church.

Col. D. Y. Wheeler of Denver, who is in town, says the main occasion of there being so many empty houses in the Queen City is because of the new apartment houses which are rapidly filled up by families who previously were living in rented homes. They found that on the whole they could live a little cheaper in apartment houses, with generally better conveniences, and an absence of the servant's problem, so there has been a steady flow of families into these great houses. Col. Wheeler prophesies that the Emery-Holmes apartment house will be filled all as soon as it is completed, and thus empty many houses now occupied.
