MODERN PROGNOSTICATIONS.

THAT great convulsions of nature, "signs in the heavens and on the earth," trouble and distress of nations, war, tumult, pestilence, famine, earthquakes, tornadoes, tidal waves and troubles from various sources will affect mankind in the latter times to a degree never known in previous ages, is plainly foretold in the Jewish Scriptures, corroborated in the Book of Mormon, and reiterated in the revelations of God contained in the Doctrine and Covenants. All these things will surely be fulfilled, and be noted by the wise as signs of the times and heralds of the glorious change to come in the "end of the world," that is, the overthrow of human governments, the establishment of the kingdom of God, and the advent of Him whose right it is to reign over all the earth.

Forewarnings of these events are given to many who are in a condition to receive, the premonitions and by vision, dream, the manifestations of the spirit of truth, and various methods, the minds of those who are spiritual may be prepared for the events about to take place. But there are many false spirits abroad in the earth seeking to deceive, and they have power to lead astray the susceptible who are not guided by the spirit that comes from on high. There are to be "false Christs and false prophets" in the latter days, as well as the true revealers of the Divine will, and "even the very elect" are almost in danger of being led astray unless they hold fast to the keys that have been given to them.

We have noticed that one of the great failures of prognosticators in this and former periods has been in regard to times and seasons. The events foretold may transpire, but fixing the time has led into error. It is seldom that the exact date of a future occurrence is predicted by the inspired servants of the living God. "It is not for you to know the times and the seasons" has been said to many besides the early disciples of the Nazarene. A coming occurrence may be clearly made known and yet it may be truthfully said, "of the day and the hour no man knoweth."

The revelations of God, ancient and modern, abound with references

to the judgments to be poured out in the last days, and they who are influenced by the spirit which portrayed these things to the prophets will be looking for their fulfillment, with an approximate knowledge as to the generation in which they will surely transpire, while others who have no guide on which to depend, will be deceived by the errors of false prophets and the date-fixing of others.

We are led to these remarks by the numerous prognostications made in different quarters concerning disasters said to be near at hand. Our readers will remember that President Arthur received a communication from a Canadian astronomer, predicting a terrible cyclone in March. As it may be interesting to many, we here insert the prediction given by Professor E. Stone Wiggins, L. L. D.:

"OTTAWA, Nov. 27, 1882.

To His Excellency, President Arthur, President of the United States, Washington:—

May it please Your Excellency—On the 23d of September last I announced through the Canadian press that a great storm would occur in March next; that it would first be felt in the Northern Pacific, would appear in the Gulf of Mexico on the night of the 9th and, being deflected by the Rocky Mountains, would cross the meridian from the west at noon of Sunday, March 11, 1883. No vessel, whatever her dimensions, will be safe out of harbor, and none of small tonnage can hope to survive the tidal wave and fury of this tempest. As the wind blew from the southeast the planetary force will be sufficient to submerge the lowlands of the American coast, especially those bordering on the Gulf of Mexico and washed by the Gulf stream, while the air currents for several hundred miles along the east side of the Rocky Mountain ridge, owing to the great atmospheric pressure in those regions, will spread universal destruction. The New England States will also suffer severely from the wind and floods. No point outside of harbor in the whole area of the Atlantic, especially north of the equator, will be a place of safety, for this will be pre-eminently the greatest storm that has visited this continent since the days of your illustrious first President.

In view of this event, therefore, I take the great liberty of representing to your Excellency the advisability of ordering all United States ships into safe harbors not later than the 5th of March till this storm be passed."

This prediction has caused considerable discussion, and the weather wise have decided that the astronomer has made a big mistake as to the course of wind currents. March is a blustery month, and there may something occur to give support to the Wiggins prophecy. If March passes away without any extraordinary atmospheric disturbance, Wiggins may retire from the profession. But that he has some followers who repose confidence in his warning is evident from the annexed, which was published in the New York Herald as an "open letter to the President of the United States:—

"May it please your excellency to listen to the voice of wisdom that crieth aloud and uttereth her voice of warning to guard the nation against the impending ruin, so scientifically predicted by the great astronomer of Canada. A great prophecy has been proclaimed. Science, the handmaid and ally of religion, has come to the front and, in unmistakable words, signaled the approaching danger. Let not the eye of discernment nor the ear of understanding be slow of comprehension. The woful devastation has been long in coming, but the time draweth nigh. The wind bloweth where it listeth; meteors have appeared and vanished; tidal waves have lashed our shores; atmospheric pressures have been almost beyond endurance, until now, in the near future, a grand culmination will be reached, and the great disturbing forces will hurl destruction broadcast to be repaired at leisure. The great syndicates which have been formed in the land to control the national interests occasion rumblings as of distant thunder; trial forces glimmer in the forked lightnings of the higher courts; volcanic readjustments belch forth fire and smoke, still the clouds thicken and the darkness darkens.

which has not been since the time of the illustrious Washington and may never be again. From the shores of the Pacific to the Gulf Stream of the South, from the borders of the Atlantic and the land of the Pilgrim Fathers the clouds of strife are gathering for the battle and the houses of Washington will rock in the seething tumult.

Would it not be the part of wisdom to call in the men-of-war and anchor the Ship of State in a harbor of safety, shielded and protected by the strong arm of public confidence? Shall it be said of this people, "And there were voices and thunders and lightnings; and there was a great earthquake, such as was not since men were upon the earth, so mighty and so great. And the great city (Washington) was divided into three (political) parts, and the cities of the nation fell?"

We have yet another prognosticator to introduce; he hails from Cincinnati and writes as follows, that his 'fellow mortals may be led to escape these great judgments:—
