which, despite the tremendous exertions
made by the citizens, spread to several
storés adjoining, and before it was extinguished, destroyed property to the amount
of not less than \$75,000. The Post says this
is the largest fire that has ever occurred in Montana.

On the evening of the 16th inst., the same paper says that the Helena Theatre had a very narrow escape from destruction by tire. A kerosene lamp was accidentally broken, the oil taking fire, when the blaze instantly extended across the stage.


