



FARMINGTON. DAVIS COUNTY ORCHARDS.

Big Profits in Fruit Growing County Board of Horticulture,

Special Correspondence. Farmington, Davis Co., June 25 .- Secy.

Jos. H. Parry of the state board of horticulture, has been visiting this county in the interest of fruit growing the past two days. He finds that though much is being done in commerthough much is being done in commer-cial fruit growing in the north end of the county, small mixed orchards are the rule in the south end, with much land devoted to truck gardening that would pay twice the profits if grown to fruit. When fruit growing, requiring no more the set of the


