The handsome and substantial pyramid of colors from the mountain lead and color works 2d do of Mr. F. J. P. Pascoe, 17th ward, consisting of massicot, red lead, pure white lead, yellow ochre, litherage (number one and two,) venetian red, red ochre, orange, prussian blue, prussian green, putty and whitening, was truly a gratifying spectacle; and we consider this a step, second in importance to none, in securing to Utah her commercial independence. Akin to this we were proud to see the boxes of yellow ochre, resin, venetian red, and refined saleratus by Mr. Funk of Sanpete as well as lampblack from Iron county.

Mr. Pyper's collection, including a large box of alum, specimens of sublimed sulphur, and refined saleratus were worthy of commendation and should meet with public sup-

port and encouragement.

The soap and matches were certainly a decided improvement. Prest. H. C. Kimball's linseed oil, also specimens of lard, butter and neats foot oil from the factory of Mr. Daveys were exhibited.

The cigars raised and manufactured at St. George were pro ounced a superior article. Boards plained and tongued by machinery from Payson, like wise good specimens of iron ore, said to be from near Provo, were exhibited.

In class L-cutlery hardware, etc., - there were some good specimens. Several boxes of cut nails of a superior quality, also bundles of hoop iron, from the factory of Prest. Daniel H. Wells were exhibited. The specimens of revolving rifles, dragoon and revolving pist ls, from the public works were highly credi able, as was the specimen yager, made from a 3d do relic of the burning at Camp Floyd. The specimens of rope, cord and twine, as u-ual, were good. The baskets, especially those from the factory of Pearce & Smith, were of a superior character to any heretofore exhibited, and reflected credit on their estab'ishment.

The late in provements in earthenware, as Eardley & Brothers was very flattering. The fine specimens of school slates exhibited show that if our increasing wants in that article are not fully supplied, it is not for the lack of

material. Class M - ladie's ornamental work - as usual, was very well represented; among which was an extensive contribution by Mrs. Howard Egan, consisting of a very handsome silk shawl, bed spread, good specimens of ayrshire need e work, etc., all manufactured by the family. A very magnificent embroidered piano f rte cover, with specimens 2d do of raw and spun silk and a handsome scarf spun and woven from native silk, also two Awarding Committee .- Mrs. Hunter, Mrs. Hemknitted table covers, manufactured from Utah cotton by a Danish lady contributed to the richness of this department.

In class N-produce, we observed some good specimens. The molasses or strup exhibited, manufactured from the sugar cane, 2d do was very fine, a specimen from Payson in a state of granulation, was half sugar, and was manufactured from the cane by cutting off the two joints at the top, and one at the bottom. The : pecimens of maple sugar from Payson received the fi st prize.

A Morse telegraphic register, relay magnet and key, with a grove battery was erected in the upper room by Mr. Clowes, who operated and gave explanations during the Fair.

The Brass bands of Captains Wm. Pitt and Prof. C. J. Thomas, likewise the Serenade band gratuitous!y attended consecutively during each day of the Fair and enlivened the exhibition, by discoursing their sweetest strains of music.
