The children census of California foots up 330,709. Alameda county stands third, Los Angeles second, with Alpine the lowest, with only eighty-six children of school age.

As an instance of the growth of the Jerome mining camp, Arizona, it is noted that within the past few months building sites have been sold to the amount of \$14,055, and that on nearly every lot sold there has been erected a building which is at the present time occupied.

The city trustees of Riverside, Cal., have inaugurated a plan for a free employment bureau for the unemployed. They instructed the city marshal to open in his office a list of those out of work, which shall at all times be open for inspection by those wanting help. It costs nothing to register.

The indications are that a beet sugar factory with a capacity equal to the one at Chino will soon be constructed on the Cerritos, in the neighborhood of Bxby station, and not far from the town of Long Beach, Los Angeles, Cal. The locality selected is said to be well adapted to the production of a splendid beet rich in saccharine matter.

The ship Two Brothers, which arrived at Tacoma, Washington, Monday, from San Francisco to load coal, reports that on January 19th, while off the Oregon coast, Oscar Hartz, a sailor, fell from the lee main rigging and was drowned. It was his second trip on the ship. He was a German, 30 years old, and had lived in San Francisco.

St. John, Arizona, Herald: We received a very pleasant call last Tuesday, from our old friend, George H. Crosby, Jr. Mr. Crosby, accompanied by his wife, has been making a visit to relatives and friends in this country, and is now on his way back to his home at Richfield. He is editor and proprietor of the Southern Censor, published at Richfield. He established his paper about a year ago, and says it has already passed the experimental stage. Last Sunday night, about 9 o'clock, Nestor Rivas shot and killed Placido Alvarez, in Deming, N. M. Nestor and Alvarez had had some trouble with another Mexican near the Bull's Head saloon but they separated, Rivas and Alvarez going to their home, but the other fellow (whose name is not obtainable) followed them in an ugly mood and commenced throwing rocks at the house of Rivas and Alvarez. Alvarez went out of the house and while trying to persuade the Mexican to leave, Rivas came out with his gun, and the Mexican seeing Rivas taking aim at him, quickly pulled Alvarez in front of him just as Rivas fired, the bullet going through the Mexican's arm and hitting Alvarez in the bowels. He died in about an hour, but not until he stated that the shooting was accidental, Rivas intending the shot for the other fellow.
