At present danger no-Whereas, Certain individuals constiuting what is known as the Stateboard of health have taken upon themselves unwarranted authority in their efforts to introduce in our midst compulsory vaccination and have issued orders excluding from our public schools all children who will not comply with their mandates and have injected into their systems the germs of scrofula and kinded diseases, and inasmuch as there is not a single case of smallpox in our ity, such stringent measures are entirely unnecessary, therefore be it Resolved. That we as citizens and taxpayers of American Fork City, in mass meeting assembled, denounce the actions of these autocratic individuals, who are endeavoring to force upon us measures not only contrary to the wishes of the great majority of the peobut at variance with good sense thereby abridging our rights as Amerian citizens. We declare ourselves opposed to enforcing compliance with a medical fad to the great discomfiture of the people of the State in order to gratify the vishes and fill the pockets of the medical fraternity. We believe the theory of vaccination has been weighed in the balance and found wanting, and we object most decidedly to the doctors experimenting upon the people with a theory that has been exploded by European countries and which has caused misery in many s home. As proof of the bad effects of vaccination we point to the case of several individuals in our own neighbor-hood. One of whom lost her sight, another's arm was left in a crippled condition for life. We declare ourselves in favor. either admitting all healthy children to our public schools, which we are compelled to support, or else close the schools entirely until such a time as the matter may be definitely settled. PEOPLE ARE INDIGNANT. Considerable excitement has prevailed in our city caused by the arbiaction of our local board health acting under orders from the State board closing the schools to all

eachers and children who do not comwith vaccination. We have not a single case of smallpox in our midst and our local board of health had informed the trustees that if the holiday vacation could be extended until Thursday, the 19th inst., no objection would be raised to all healthy eachers and pupils entering school, ir espective of vaccination, but notwith-

standing these facts, Dr. Baker, who claimed to be a duly authorized agent of the State board of health, happened along on the very day of the opening of school and demanded the loca health board to refuse admission to all un-vaccinated children and teachers. stating that should the local board re-fuse to comply, the State board would

issue an order, and further, that the State executive was ready to enforce the order by means of the State militia if necessary. The local board accordingly issued the order and the results are depleted schools and an enraged populace. Not one-tifth of the children have been vac-ciriated. In fact one teacher only has three pupils, all from families immune from vaccination. A crowded mass meeting of the citizens was held in the theater last evensens was held in the theater last dech-ing, to denounce the action of the health board and seek redress for wrongs, William M. Brimley was elect-ed chairman and George F. Shelley, secretary. Remarks denunciatory of secretary. Remarks denunciatory of compulsory vaccination and the action of the health boards, were made by William M. Bromley, F. D. Huish, Ebenezer Hunter, George F. Shelley and others. Dr. J. F.
