Address from Two Salt Lake City Superintendents.

An Answer to Young Singers from Prof. Stephen—Silver Imperial Teachers.

The monthly meeting of the Sunday school officers and teachers of the Salt Lake Stake was held in the Fourthward ward assembly hall on Monday evening the 18th inst.

He said that the parents who were neglected held no better general enjoyment as much of the spirit of the Lord as they otherwise might.

Another matter of importance in making a school successful was for the parents to let their children they intended to work and have a good and interest in their work.

All persons are not adapted for teachers, but when there are those who show an aptitude to themselves they should be encouraged to do so, and those from other classes as when they can fit their abilities to that one duty.

In answer to questions put to him Brother Davis replied that the success of a Sabbath school depended more upon the efforts of the officers than upon the pupils, and that any school can be made successful by being properly conducted.

The sold-out communion from Evan Stevens was read.

Superintendent Briggs urged especially the parents of the young of their wards who attend the青年 choir to take part in the singing in the Sunday school. He also reminded them of the importance of adhering to the recommendations given to the Sunday school by Capt. Stevenson.
