LOCAL BRIEFS.

Civil Service Exam.—There will be a civil service examination in this city May 29, for the position of inspector of construction in the quartermaster's department at Fort Sherman, Wyo., at \$300 per annum.

Primary Entertainment.—The Triumphant Association of the Twentieth ward will give an entertainment consisting of a mixed program in the amusement hall, Friday, May 3, commencing at 8:15 p. m. sharp.

Plans for Newhouse Hotel.—Three sets of plans for the Newhouse hotel have been submitted to Mr. Newhouse by Architect Cobb, and he will make his selection next week before he leaves New York for Salt Lake.

Revivals at First Baptist.—The revivals at the First Baptist church will be continued anywhere until Thursday, and if the interest is still strong, they will continue on through the week. There were several baptisms last evening.

Auto Hits Fender.—A big automobile ran into a street car fender that was lying on the street on First south near Main, last evening. The car was tangled up in the front wheels so that it required half an hour to get them loose.

Fair Weather.—The weather will be fair for the next two days, with frost tonight. This cold weather is checking the melting, and the water situation will not be as strenuous as it has been.

Coldfield Has Skating Rink.—Advices from Coldfield state that the Bettelinger Foss company, of Salt Lake City, have completed a new skating rink at that city, on the corner of Main and Franklin streets. The rink is 150 feet long, and will comfortably hold 400 skaters.

Revival at Baptist Church.—The First Baptist church was crowded last evening, notwithstanding the absence of street car conveniences, and six persons were baptized while at the close of the services several others applied for admission to the church. The meetings continue through today, and tomorrow.

Monthly Muster at Fort.—Today is the monthly muster at Fort Douglas, when the enlisted soldiers are being reviewed by the commanding officer, Col. B. C. Lockwood. Fourteen recruits arrived yesterday from Fort Snelling and six more are expected tomorrow from Jefferson barracks, and 24 from Columbus barracks.

Pat Moran in His Own Trench.—P. C. Moran ran his 45 horsepower automobile into a trench on east Second south street, yesterday, and tore off a front wheel, besides shaking it up. The automobile was taken to the repair shop. As the trench was dug by Moran's own men, the incident is regarded in many quarters as an act of retributive justice.

Vacated Auto in Hurry.—Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Dinwiddie recently discovered that the automobile in which they were riding was on fire. With 17 gallons of gasoline in the main tank, and two more in the reserve tank, they concluded to vacate, and left no time in doing so. They returned to a safe distance to await the explosion which, however, failed to occur. Then they returned to investigate, and found the car had exploded. Where it went to could not be explained.

Dr. Rankin Gets a Call.—Rev. Dr. Rankin of Brigham City is to leave the state this week for Greensburg, Ind., his former home and where he will remain, after having been in Utah for 11 years. He will be given a public reception there tonight, as a send-off by local citizens. The mission society will hold a service in his honor, under the direction of Misses Bodil and Donnie Thompson who have been giving instruction there for two years.

New Incorporation.—Articles of incorporation of the Little Rock Manufacturing company of this city have been filed with the county clerk. The capitalization of the company is \$200,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. Paul Nelson is president; E. H. Dyer, vice president; Max Brown, secretary and treasurer. The company owns the patent rights to the "Little Rock Cleaner," a preparation for cleaning brass and silver patented by Mr. Dyer and will manufacture and sell the same.

THE NEED TO STRIKE HIS WIFE
BURGARS THE WOMAN TO CHAIR

Is the Complaint Brought Against Alfred Aileen Which Charges Cruelty.
Enter Residence of Frank L. Snider and Bind and Gag His Wife.

TWO MORE DIVORCE SUITS. THEN SEARCH THE HOUSE.

Daily Average of Unhappy Couples is Being Maintained With Actions Filed in District Court.

Two suits for divorce were filed in the district court yesterday afternoon. Edith Aileen is seeking a divorce from Alfred Aileen on the ground of cruelty. They were married in this city on May 15, 1897, and it is alleged that for some time past defendant has used vile and abusive language towards plaintiff and has threatened to strike her. They have one child, of which plaintiff asks the custody. She also asks for \$10 per month alimony and that her husband be restrained from disposing of property estimated at about \$4,000 pending the hearing of the case.

Mary E. Britcher asks a divorce from J. E. Britcher on the grounds of desertion and failure to support. They were married at Laramie, Wyo., on May 22, 1902, and have one child, of which plaintiff asks the custody. It is alleged by Mrs. Britcher that her husband deserted her on Sept. 11, 1903, and has ever since failed to support her.

BOTH DISCHARGED.
Judge Armstrong Releases Wilson and Morgan on Technically.

George Wilson and J. Morgan were discharged by Judge Armstrong yesterday afternoon from the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. The men were accused of passing a \$10 Confederate bill for house money, and appealed their case from Judge Hild's court, where they had been convicted. The discharge was under a technicality.

TO TEST TWO-CENT RATE.
Suit Against Northern Pacific Officers Will Be Filed in Minnesota.

New York, April 26.—The Tribune today says. Certain stockholders of the Northern Pacific Railway company will, it is understood, bring a friendly suit against the officers of the company for an injunction to restrain them from accepting the two-cent rate law in Minnesota as far as the company is concerned, perhaps two years ago. The Great Northern will doubtless become a party to the proposed suit.

COURT NOTES.
Judge Armstrong has appointed Henry W. Lawrence administrator of the estate of Mrs. Julia A. Kimball, deceased, and has fixed his bond at \$57,000.

The Oregon Short Line Railroad company has filed suit in the district court against the A. K. Ryer. The company to condemn a part of lot 4, block 61, plat A, Salt Lake City survey, for railroad purposes.

An action has been filed in the district court by the Utah Mining Machinery & Supply company against A. Hamner, P., to recover the sum of \$85.56 alleged to be due on a promissory note executed on Feb. 5, 1906.

The case which has been filed against Stephen Hays for the purpose of testing the ordinance requiring smoke coming from all large boilers and heating plants was called yesterday before Judge Whitaker of the city court. Mr. Hays entered a plea of not guilty and the case was then continued indefinitely.

A petition has been filed in the district court by the officers of Nunn's Black Oil & Drug company of 57 west First south street, asking that the company be dissolved. It was decided at a meeting of the stockholders on April 25 to dissolve the corporation. The petition will be heard by Judge Morse on June 5.

James Markey has filed suit in the district court against N. K. Sheridan, a 423 for an alleged false arrest. It is claimed that Sheridan swore to a complaint against plaintiff on March 21 charging him with petit larceny and on March 22, Markey was arrested and taken to the jail. By reason of the action of Sheridan, plaintiff claims that he lost his position with the American Smelting & Refining company for \$200, and the expense of employing counsel to defend himself and was otherwise injured in character and reputation in the sum of \$2,025.

William J. Cooper has filed suit in the district court against the Utah Light & Power company, the Utah Light & Railway company, and the Utah Light & Power company, and was a judgment from the Power company to the Light & Railway company. Cooper was given a verdict against the Utah Light & Power company for \$20,000 for personal injuries received while employed by the company. The execution was issued against the company, but it was found that all the property had been transferred to the Utah Light & Railway company which had absorbed the old company. It is now asked that the judgment be transferred to the new company, and that it be compelled to pay the same.

Suit for divorce has been filed in the district court by Emma Daniels against Frank H. Daniels on the ground of desertion. It is alleged by Mrs. Daniels that she was married to defendant in San Francisco on Feb. 1901, and that they were in the San Francisco earthquake. After spending several days in the refugee camps, they decided to come to Utah. Mrs. Daniels got free transportation and came to this city, and her husband promised to follow her as soon as he could get transportation. He never came, and she has heard from him, and she does not know where he is and asks that the service be made by publication.
