## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Committed to Asylum**—Judge Armstrong yesterday afternoon committed Edward L. Bird of Murray to the State Mental hospital. Bird was in such a bad condition that it was necessary to conduct his examination at the county jail.

**W.H. Take Body Home**—Mrs. Mary Pearce of Aspen, Colo., arrived last evening, to take home the remains of her brother, W. H. Bray who shot and killed George Harris on Commercial street, Saturday last, and then suicided. The Order of Eagles will bury Bray.

**Kennel Premiums**—Sevy. Ensign of the State Fair association is getting out a list of dog kennel premiums for distribution; and the executive committee is meeting this afternoon to discuss further plans and operations looking towards making the coming year a success.

**Street Car Changes**—The cars for the new Superior addition service carry the legend, "North Salt Lake." If the city council does not grant the franchise desired by the street railway management, the Fort Douglas cars via the high line, will run over Third avenue.

**Operation Successful**—After spending several weeks in the hospital where he was operated upon for a growth in his neck, Stanhope of Schools Nelson returned to his desk yesterday afternoon looking lighter by about 40 pounds than he was when he went to the hospital. He is practically well now and expects to recover his lost flesh in short order.

**Veteran Going East**—Thos. Lougney of this city, claimed to be the youngest man who fought in the Civil war, will attend the national encampment, and visit with his sister in New York whom he has not seen since 1862. Mr. Lougney was a bugler in the army of the Potomac under Custer, serving in D troop, Seventh Michigan cavalry. He was a prisoner at Andersonville and Libby.

**State Board to Investigate**—Several members of the state board of land commissioners will go to Pottsborough, Ohio, to investigate the feasibility of constructing a reservoir in the basin of the Scioto river for the reclamation of arid lands in that locality. The amount of land to come under the system watered by the reservoir and the general feasibility of the scheme will be thoroughly gone into on the trip.

**CO-OPERATIVE MEAT SHOPS**—With the railroad clerks another co-operative movement is starting. Railroad clerks belong to the class whose salaries are not capable of expansion to meet sudden rises, and their method of fighting back is consequently to organize to keep the costs down as far as possible. A committee from the clerks of the Denver & Rio Grande, the Utah Line & Railway Company, the Oregon Short Line road, has been selected to form a co-operative society to retail meats, groceries and provisions. A capitalization of \$50,000 has been decided upon, \$5,000 of which is to be already subscribed, while a manager has been selected, as well as a president. About 1,800 clerks are eligible for membership according to the claims of some who are backing the movement, and sentiment among them is so strong that they are declared to be willing to back the store to the limit. To describe the local retailers they do not take the word of Mr. Morgan and call them "wolfish," or that of a prominent cattlemen who calls them "hog-sniffing," but instead they mention them as "rapacious."

**LEAVES FOR NEW FIELD**—R. P. Nichols, who has been attending the Methodist missionary conference in this city during the past week, left for his new field of duty at Price, Utah, with his wife and two children, on Sunday. Nichols will hold the double position of minister in the Methodist church at Price and also of teacher in the schools of that city. Formerly Mr. Nichols was in charge of the Methodist work in San Juan, Porto Rico.

**H. B. Goodwin Takes Charge**—The Gordon academy teaching force is considerably strengthened this year by the presence of H. B. Goodin of Huntington, Indiana, who assumed the assistant principality of the academy yesterday. Though yet a young man Mr. Goodin is a teacher of considerable experience, his latest work being the capacity of government supervisor and organizer in the civil service schools of the Philippines Islands where he served two years with splendid success. Prior to his government service he did special high school work in Indiana, and also was instructor in the language department of Valparaiso college. The work that he takes up at the academy is right along the lines of his best experience.

## PLAN CO-OP STORES FOR LOCAL NEEDS

Railroad Clerks Organize One—Harrington Declares That Another Will Start.

## RELIEF IN PACKING PLANT.

It Promises Independent Meat Shops To Handle its Products in Salt Lake.

The Utah Commercial Advertiser, whose manager, W. D. S. Harrington, declares he was boycotted out of business by the Grocers & Butchers' trust, plans to renew publication since the recent antagonism to combinations in restraint of trade was developed, and to foster a co-operative store plan, with both wholesale and retail organizations enlisted in the movement. It will follow what Mr. Harrington designates the Rockdale Wholesale company plan, a proposal of which Mr. Harrington has made against the Butchers & Grocers' trust. He says, "that the Butchers & Grocers' trust waged a long and relentless boycott against this paper and we are sure to succeed in getting the trust to submit to such an extent that the paper can subsist. It will now assist in opening co-operative stores in every state in Salt Lake and in other cities and towns, out of the jails and penitentiaries.

"Teach your boys to despise a liar, to shun him as they would a viper. A hero means a thief, a graft, a drunkard, a thief. If you can have a boy a hero tell the truth all the time you have a splendid structure which will be as a light on a hill guiding others in the right way."

"I regard this work among the boys and girls as of paramount importance, if these boys' cities could be started in every state and county in the Union, it would be in my opinion, do more for the uplift and purification of the youth of the land than a thousand Carnegie libraries, and, supplemented by juvenile courts and detention homes, men and women, out of the jails and penitentiaries.

"This is a great work you have undertaken, the good people, the mothers and fathers, must stand behind you and all of those splendid workers in this great cause. My heart is in this work and if the people of this country could only be brought to realize the great need for work among the youth of the land, I am sure the hands of the active workers, like yourself and a few others, would be upheld, and this work would receive a great impetus."
