LOCAL BRIEFS.

Putting in Cables.—The Utah Light & Railway company is excavating on east Third Street, for underground cable conduits.

Church Social.—There will be a Congregational social at the Central Christian church this evening, with music.

Recovering from Operation.—G. S. Holmes, Jr., is recuperating at Low Angeles from an operation on appendicitis, of which he has a severe attack.

Down With Whooping Cough.—Six children in the family of J. S. Schell, 355 Euclid avenue, are down with the whooping cough the patients ranging from six weeks to six years.

R. E. Benedict Back Again.—R. E. Benedict, who resigned from the forest service last summer, has been induced to reconsider his action, and is back again in the service as a general inspector.

All Ready to Build.—The Utah Light & Railway company is ready to take up the rebuilding of the Port Douglas line as soon as Mr. Newhouse furnishes the funds to the right of way through Popperston.

Storming Ft. Douglas.—The Salvation Army has just established a post at Fort Douglas, where an enthusiastic meeting was held Sunday evening. Many of the soldiers of the Fifteenth infantry are becoming interested.

Boys' Election.—A Y. M. C. A. circular letter to the principals of the public schools, and a letter to each school of a boy best fitted for the purpose to sit on the board of elections in the coming boys' election in this city.

Social for Church Members.—The ladies of the Presbyterian church will entertain members of the congregation and friends of the church tomorrow evening, in the church parlors. There will be a musical program and refreshments.

Hiking in the Rain.—The Fifteenth infantry started off on a three-days' hike yesterday afternoon, up Emigration canyon, to break in the footpaths that have been made since the summer encampment. The boys are enjoying it in the rain.

Lecture by Judge King.—In the court room of Judge George G. Armstrong tonight, Judge William H. King will deliver a lecture on "The Cough Continued." The meeting will be held under the auspices of the Sons of Utah, a society recently organized in this city.

Transit Disciplined.—The Grand Jury, aged 19, and William H. Trencher, aged 12, were sent to the Utah Training school by Judge Gowans of the juvenile court yesterday, for being out of control, and for truancy and using vulgar language, but the majority of the cases were dismissed with reprimands.

Builders to Organize.—A building trades council for the American Federation of Labor, for Salt Lake will be organized next Monday evening, in Federation hall, with President P. H. McCarthy of the Building Trades council at San Francisco to make an address, as will also President W. D. Huber and General Secy. Frank Duffy of the Carpenters' union.

Endless Chain of Prayer.—People are still sending out the country the "Endless Chain of Prayer" letter, about the press of the country had much to say. The letter, which was sent to Bishop Lawrence of Massachusetts, a dignitary of the Episcopal church, with the recommendation that it be sent to all other bishops. The bishop protested that he did not know anything about the prayer chain, and ascribed it to some harmless crank. Several Salt Lake people are in receipt of these chain letters.

Milkmen on Anxious Seat.—The city food inspector keeps up his endless round of joy in keeping the city milkmen on their toes without regard to the weather. He harvested another batch of milk samples yesterday for the city chemist to consider, stopping and doubting he chanced to find one, and taking samples of their wares. The result is pure milk for Salt Lake, and the city chemist says that all of the canned goods now coming into this city are "straight stuff"—no more adulterations.

Line Out of Commission.—The West Temple car line on which a single car operates a half-hourly service, went out of commission in last night's storm, through a spreading of the rails between 10th and 12th South. The district was flooded at the time, and it was late this morning before service could be resumed. The line has been dubbed the "washboard line" by its patrons, on account of the dilapidated condition of the roadbed. Orders should it with heavy steel and cement, the line to Twelfth South have been on the taps since the program of improvements and extensions was announced a year ago. Extensive repairs to the roadbed have been ordered for this fall.

HOUSES ARE CLOSED UP

Denizens of Tenderloin Badly Scared By Actions of County Authorities Preparing for Exodus.

Owing to the crowded condition of the county jail, some of the women of the town arrested by Sheriff Emery's deputies Tuesday night were taken to the Murray jail, where arrangements had been made for them.

Last evening and yesterday afternoon deputies visited the tenderloin district and warned the women that the sheriff proposed to keep up the good work started and rid the town of the lawless element. As a result of the raid and the warning given, the houses on Commercial street and Victoria alley were closed up tight. In most cases the front doors were locked and no one was permitted to enter. There was no street walking of the kind complained of, and the parasites who hang about houses of ill fame were conspicuous by their absence. This class is scared, and badly scared, there is no doubt whatever, and many of them are making preparations to shake the dust, or mud, of Salt Lake from their feet.

The officers who went around last night went in pairs for self protection, as threats have been made by men who live from the earnings of the women to get even with the deputies. These fellows see in the movement of the fine chance to loose their meat tickets and they are not at all delighted with the prospect.
