The Oracles Predict Further Advances in the Red Metal. The advance to 16 cents a pound which was recorded yesterday in the price of copper, is the highest point the red metal has reached this year. Those

who have foretold higher prices for per are' proven to be right. It is thought that the end is not yet, for with the market broadening out a further increase is considered one of the sure things of the future. The Boston News Bureau has the following to say

News Bureau has the following to say of the situation: "The general tone of the copper market is strong and some sellers have withdrawn offers to sell at 17 cents. This price was said to have been bid for 500,000 pounds and declined. Several weddeness have sold at 17 cents see de producers have sold at 17 cents for de-livery by boat. The market has broad-

ened out, and domestic manufacturers have been ready buyers at 17 cents for lake brands." A prominent Boston broker is quoted

by the same paper on the furture of copper stocks as follows: There can be no question as to the position of the public in this market when transactions reach 1,000,000 shares per day for three or four days. The activity in New York has at last been reflected in the local market and there is no question in my mind but that the copper stocks are in for a good rise. You cannot keep copper stocks down for any length of time in an advancing metal market. There is hardly a cop-per stock on the list that in my opinion
