

## CONSECUTIVE POLYGAMY.

"The last number of *Demorest's Magazine*, in discussing 'consecutive polygamy,' says that this phrase has been coined to characterize properly the polygamy which is common outside of Utah. In that Territory the Mormons practice simultaneous polygamy; that is, they have several wives at the same time. They are, however, bound to support them and their children. But in 'consecutive polygamy' complained of as practiced elsewhere, an immoral man may have a number of wives in succession. In a majority of cases he abandons them and their offspring; this is really one of the scandals of our civilization. In Indiana, last year, the ratio of divorces to marriages was one to ten, and in all the States the number of divorces is alarmingly large and steadily increasing. The war upon the Mormons loses much of its moral force from the laxity of marriage ties in the country at large."

True, it would look a little more consistent if those who howl so about the "Mormons" having a plurality of wives and remaining true to their marriage vows, were themselves true to the promises they have made to love, honor and cherish until death does them part the one wife each which they hold it to be a man's privilege to take. But if the consecutive polygamy, or the alternate marrying and divorcing of wives prevails to so large an extent among anti-"Mormons" detractors from the moral force of "the war upon the Mormons," what is to be said of that other practice of which so many of the foremost of that ilk are known to be guilty—consorting with lewd women outside of the marriage relation, unknown to their wives, while they pose before the nation as models of virtue and champions of morality? And what is to be said of Federal officials who wrest the law from its plain intent and screech and howl for governmental interference or martial law to be declared to screen the lechers from exposure and punishment?

The *Magazine* might have said that the "Mormons" were bound by the most sacred covenants to be true to their wives, whether they have one or more; that they could not extend their liaisons outside the marriage relation and retain a membership in their Church, and that cases of infidelity are so extremely rare among them that the contrast between their morals and those of their opponents whose acts are referred to is like that between light and darkness or heaven and hades.

## WATER FEEDING FIRE.

THE overflow caused by exceptionally high tides, in and around New York, has caused a vast amount of damage. But there has been one catastrophe resulting from it which is not a little remarkable. A large building yard was consumed by a fire that was kindled by the water. We have all heard the remark about setting the Thames on fire, but who ever heard before of a river that set a building yard on fire? Yet that was just what the East River did, if we may credit news that seems to be authentic.

During the flood the building yard of John Bell and sons took fire and when the Fire Department attempted to extinguish it by the usual methods it was found that the more the firemen applied water the fiercer grew the flames.

The explanation of the apparent phenomenon is that on a dock near the river were several thousand barrels of lime. The overflow of the river set the lime on fire, the flames communicated to adjacent sheds and other buildings and so on to the building yard. When the usual appliances were used to fight the fire its fierceness only became greater.

That water should feed fire seems one of the most singular occurrences in this remarkable age. If fire and water can fraternize, the co-operation of the most deadly foes and most heterogeneous elements seems not impossible.
