Childrens' Concerts.

CENTERVILLE, June 15, 1874.

Miss F. B. Phelps gave two Floral Concerts at the Rock Hall, in Bountiful, on Friday and Saturday evenings last, the performers being volunteers from the Sunday and day schools of Centerville, numbering some forty in all, ages varying from five to fourteen years, being the same who a short time ago performed at a similar concert at Centerville. After the short space of fourteen hours' training they went through their pieces so well as to call forth rounds of applause from the audience. The children were all in costume, and what was still better, the decorations of their dresses were made by themselves, under the direction, of course, of their leader. When the curtain was drawn there was a scene of beauty and innocence pleasing to behold. The masterpiece of the evening's exercises was the chanting of the Lord's Prayer, the singers kneeling with their hands clasped upon their breasts. Miss Phelps presided with ease and grace at the organ, and was assisted by Professor Phelps on the violin. These concerts have inspired in the young a taste for singing and music, and a class has been formed to learn to play the organ, and owing to the good discipline, in the Sunday and day schools in this place, both of which are very well attended, our youth, both male and female, are cultivating a spirit of refinement so much to be desired by well regulated society.

MONEY ABUNDANT IN ENGLAND.—The unerring indicator of the state of the money market in England is the rate of discount at the bank of England. We learn by telegram that the rate fixed at a meeting of directors yesterday was three per cent. The rate for money at the Stock Exchange on government securities was two and a half. This shows that there is an abundance of money and that there is no drain of specie worth speaking about for foreign countries. The vast accumulation of capital and the favorable state of exchange in England result chiefly from the ability and prudent foresight of her

statesmen and capitalists. Financial matters are managed well there and always with a single eye to British interests. With us, on the contrary, there is a lamentable want of statesmanship and foresight and everything is conducted in a slipshod manner.—*N. Y. Herald*, June 5.

Utah Educational Bureau.

This Organization, established in the interests of Education in Utah, proposes to act as an agency for all kinds of educational intelligence. It will furnish information:—to school officers, who want qualified teachers; to teachers who want suitable positions; to schools, needing furniture and apparatus, concerning the most approved and suitable styles, either of eastern or home manufacture; to Literary Societies and Sunday schools, wanting suitable books for their libraries; concerning the location, character, and facilities of the principal institutions of learning in the United States; concerning the importation of foreign books for public or private libraries, free of duty; concerning the titles, authors, and publishers of the principal works extant on almost every subject; also in relation to appropriate, and economical plans and architectural designs for all kinds of school buildings.

Persons having REMAINDERS, or LOTS of books, or any rare, standard, or curious work to part with, may find sale for them through the Bureau.

The Bureau will also make out lists of appropriate books for general and special libraries.

Of Special Importance to School Officers and Teachers.

The Bureau proposes to open communication with teachers out of employment or desiring a change of location, and with trustees and other school officers wishing to engage a teacher. The object of the Bureau, in this respect, is mutual accommodation and benefit to employers and employed; that teachers may obtain positions best suited to their abilities, and that every school may secure a suitable teacher.

The design is to represent, in every respect, the whole Territory. No responsibility, however, will be taken by the Bureau, in supplying teachers and positions, beyond placing such applicants found on its register in communication with such others as are deemed most nearly suited to their requirements. To cover expenses, a charge of two and a half dollars will be made for, and must accompany each application.

10. Have you preference as to locality?
11. When can you commence?
12. What certificates or recommendations do you hold?
13. What references can you give? (Give names and address in full.)
14. For how long will you engage?

3. Is a lady or gentleman wanted?
4. Have you preference as to age?

5. What is the average number of pupils, and their age?
6. What salary will you pay?
7. How is it to be paid?

9. If without board, what does board cost?
10. Must the teacher be a church member; if so, of what denomination?
11. For how long will you engage?
12. When must the teacher commence?
13. Will you pay travelling expenses?
