

HAARON RECEIVES DELEGATIONS

Pilgrims From the United States Are Most Graciously Received.

EXPRESSED GRATIFICATION.

King and Queen Shook Hands With Members, and Thanked Them.

Tromsø, Norway, June 21.—The plans for receiving the Norwegian American delegations having been changed, King Haakon and Queen Maud received the several delegations combined at 2:45 this afternoon.

The entire court was present. The pilgrims from the United States spent 25 minutes with the king and queen.

Dease of Chicago first read an address congratulating King Haakon on his assurance of the affection of Norwegian Americans in America for Norway.

King Haakon thanked the delegations, saying he was fully aware of the value to Norway of the moral support of Norwegians in America and that it helped him when entering upon the duties of his office to know that he had their friendship and moral support.

Mr. Gade, Norway's vice consul at Chicago, then presented King Haakon with a portfolio saying that this great king also was from America and particularly from Norwegian musicians and artists there.

He handed the king that the portfolio contained a poem, written by Alfred Paulsen, which was sung at the demonstration last night.

Mr. Gade presented Mr. Renning of Milwaukee, composer of the national hymn, which also was embodied in the portfolio. King Haakon shook hands with Mr. Renning and thanked him for his work.

In reply to Mr. Gade the king expressed his warmest thanks for the portfolio and charged him to deliver a message of thanks to all who assisted in preparing or contributing to it.

The king and queen then shook hands with the entire party and thanked the members for making the long journey from the United States to assist in the coronation.

Thousands of schoolchildren paraded before the palace at noon today and were reviewed by King Haakon, Queen Maud and Crown Prince Olaf.

King Haakon, in addressing the children, expressed the appreciation of himself, his wife and his son, and commended his son to them.

He trusted that the people always would enjoy mutual confidence and work together in the future for the good of Norway.

He led the children in cheering for Norway and asked them to sing the national anthem, which he also led.

Admiral Hage and the French embassy to the coronation gave a reception this afternoon on board the cruiser Aube.

All the ambassadors, the members of the cabinet and officers of the international fleet and many persons of prominence were present.

Premier Mikkelsen proposed a toast to France, which was drunk enthusiastically and Admiral Hage thanked the premier on behalf of the French people.

New York, June 21.—The following gentlemen have consented to act in conjunction with the international policyholders' committee in the selection of candidates for directors at the annual election of the New York Life insurance company and the Mutual Life insurance company to be held next fall.

Gov. N. B. Broward of Florida, Gov. N. C. Blanchard of Louisiana, Mr. Russell H. Conwell of the Baptist church, President E. E. Clark of California, Hon. Richard Olney of Massachusetts, Gov. S. W. Pennypacker of Pennsylvania, Judge Alton B. Parker of New York, Gov. Henry Roberts of Connecticut, Col. A. M. Shook of Tennessee, Hon. Charles F. Smith of Pennsylvania, Gen. Benjamin F. Tracy of New York, Thomas B. Wainmaker of Pennsylvania, Herr Heinrich Weigand of Germany, nominated by German consuls, and representatives of English and French committees who are in course of selection and will be announced later.

OUTRAGES BY STRIKERS.

Trolley Hopes Cut, Cars Stuffed and Crews Jeered.

Allentown, Pa., June 21.—A strike of motormen and conductors of the Lehigh Valley Transit company today led to disturbances here tonight that ended in the mayor ordering out the entire police force.

Tonight a crowd of 4,000 persons gathered at the transfer point, Sixth and Hamilton streets.

Trolley ropes were cut, cars were stalled, and the crews greeted with jeers. Nearly every car was then run into the barns. Along the lines crowds gathered, hooting, and in a few instances stones were thrown.

The strikers demand the recognition of their union and the reinstatement of 15 men discharged for belonging to the organization.

REV. T. E. GUNN DEAD.

Cedar Rapids, Ia., June 21.—Thomas P. Gunn, pastor of the church of the Immaculate Conception for 49 years, died suddenly today from a stroke of apoplexy.

MEXICO THANKS GOODRICH.

Washington, June 21.—Through the state and navy departments Rear Admiral Goodrich, U. S. N., has been thanked by the Mexican government for his assistance in stamping out an epidemic of diphtheria at Magdalena Bay, Mexico.

AFTER KING ALFONSO.

La Grana, Spain, June 21.—At the moment King Alfonso and Queen Victoria arrived here from the theater in their automobile last night a well dressed individual evaded the guards and sought to intercept the royal couple.

CALLED THE INDIANS.

Mexican Parish Priest Leads Them Against Well Known Liberal.

Mexico City, June 21.—At Hamilton, state of Queretaro, a parish priest named Garcia is charged with having called the Indians living in his town together by ringing the church bells.

When a large crowd had assembled they marched to a shop kept by Rodriguez. The shop was looted and the mob then marched to the house of the prefect of the village, who was stoned.

Gov. Cosio of Queretaro sent 200 militia to the scene of the riot. When the people of the town learned of the approach of the troops they assembled in the church and the troops upon arrival entered and arrested Rodriguez.

The priest who is charged with having called the Indians together by ringing the church bells, was taken from the altar. Judge Luis Isla heard the case and discharged the priest and he is said to be in an illegal manner, not taking the deposition of the clergyman as required by law.

The federal authorities have begun an investigation and it is probable the priest will be prosecuted and the judge may be held responsible for unlawful acquittal and sentence.

MRS. LE DOUX GUILTY OF MURDER IN FIRST DEGREE.

Stockton, Cal., June 21.—Mrs. Emma Le Doux, convicted of murder in the first degree without recommendation. The jury was out over six hours.

The time for passing sentence was set for July 10. Her attorney made a forceful plea for a new trial and announced that they would take an appeal.

It was shown that the woman married McVecker in Arizona several years ago and later married a man named Le Doux. It was the theory of the prosecution that her motive for killing McVecker was her fear of prosecution for bigamy.

McVecker was poisoned in a lodging house here, the body rolled into a large trunk bought by Mrs. Le Doux and which was found at the Southern Pacific Railway station where she had a room. The body was taken to her home in Amador county. The defense was that McVecker committed suicide and that the woman was too small and frail to place the body in the trunk.

SUDANESE KILLED.

Cairo, June 21.—Three hundred and fifty Sudanese were killed and 1,000 injured by the punitive expedition sent from El Obeid to relieve the garrison at Talodi, which was attacked by native tribesmen early in June, resulting in the loss of 4 Egyptian soldiers.

No losses were sustained by the expedition. It is supposed the attack on the garrison at Talodi was due to the establishment of a government post in their midst.

A SECRET CONVENT.

One Found in Mexico City in Violation of Law.

Mexico City, June 21.—A building on Moctez street has been raided and discovered to be a convent existing in violation of the laws of reform. The house is a large one and has many cells, a chapel, a refectory and other features of a convent life.

The inmates were the nuns of Carmelites with face veils. Legal proceedings will be taken against the nuns in the court of the first district.

It is a long time since a convent has been discovered and raided here. Religious orders engaged in teaching and works of charity have not been interfered with.

THE PHILIPPINES.

Are They Part of United States in Meaning of Insurance Law?

Albany, N. Y., June 21.—Deputy Justice Graham appeared before Justice Pitts in the supreme court today and asked the court to determine whether the Philippine islands were part of the United States within the meaning of the insurance law of this state.
