Report on Court Martial Trials. Washington, Oct. 20 .- The report of Gen. George B. Davis, judge-advocate-general of the army, shows that during the year ended June 30 19 commissioned officers have been tried in court-martial traffs. Of these six have been acquitted. Two cadets have been tried and convicted. The number of enlisted men convicted was 4,854, the sentences in 158 cases being disapproved and 450 cases resulted in acquittal.

The number of men sentenced to dis. The number of men sentenced to dis-honorable discharge was 2,645. Death sentences were imposed by court-martial in eight cases of enlisted men; four of these sentences being on conviction of murder, two on conviction of descrition and of enterig the service of the energy are on conviction of descrition.
