

MET MEXICAN REVOLUTIONIST

Miss Elizabeth Cannon Tells of
Wedding She Attended at
Stowell Ranch.

TWO CONDEMNED MEN THERE

Pen Picture of Characteristic Ceremonies Attended by Vaqueros and
Dusky-Eyed Maidens.

Miss Elizabeth Cannon, daughter of President Angus M. Cannon of this city, who has spent considerable time in Mexico as a school teacher in the district which is now the scene of an incipient revolution against the government, contributes the following interesting account of a wedding at which two of the now condemned revolutionists were present.

"Twenty revolutionists who were confined in the Casas Grandes jail, have been condemned to death. As they are nearly all young men, and from the best families of the country, it was thought wise to remove them from the jail at Casas Grandes to Chihuahua to be executed. It remains to be seen whether they will die or the fashion of the country, make their escape."

"The arrest of the revolutionists followed the picking up of a paper bearing the minutes of a secret meeting and caused a furore when it was discovered that Silvestre Cavera, the son of the rich old Hefly politico and young Portio, son of the tax collector, the two most popular young men in the town, were leaders in the movement.
