"The arrest of the revolutionists followed the picking up of a paper hearing the minutes of a secret meeting and caused a finrore when it was discovered that Silvester Caveva, the son of the rich old Heffy politics and young Portle, son of the tax collector, the two most popular young men in the town, were leaders in the gang. If the orders of President Diaz are carried out and the young men shot, it is likely to cause widespread trouble.
