## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Frank Lyman Convalescing—Frank Lyman, a Wasatch school pupil who was struck down by an automobile Friday last, and taken to the hospital, is convalescing and able to be out.

School Teacher Recovering—Miss Meta Gerber, the public school teacher who was so terribly burned a year ago by an alcohol explosion, after having suffered amputation of her right leg, is convalescing and able to be out.

Transferred to Fifteenth—Private J. S. Ramsay of the army recruiting station in this city has secured his discharge from the Fifteenth Infantry, and went up to Fort Douglas this morning with his kit. The change is very agreeable to him.

## NEW ENTERPRISE BOON TO MOTHERS

Day Nursery, Where Babies May Be Kept During Sessions Of Conference.

ESTABLISHED AT LION HOUSE

Competent Nurses Will be in Charge, And Long Felt Want Will be Supplied.

An enterprise has been instituted which promises to be a boon to the mothers who come from a distance to attend conference. It is in the nature of a day nursery, where children under five years of age may be left in competent hands during eight hours of the day and cared for by competent women, who will be there for this purpose. The nursery will be established in the basement of the Lion House and will be open from 9:30 a. m. to 5:30 p. m., during the three days of conference, commencing Sunday, Oct. 4, and continuing through Monday and Tuesday.

Necessary articles will be furnished for the enterprise by loan or donation in the way of coats, cradles, bed furnishings, etc. No food will be furnished, these necessities to be provided by the parents or guardians. The small sum of 10 cents an hour will be charged for the care.

The necessity for such an arrangement has long been evident to all who have attended conference, both for sake of the mothers overburdened with care of small children during their stay in the city, which frequently interferes both with their attendance at the conference sessions, also from hunger and recreation, and for the conference sessions, which are often seriously disturbed by the number of small children throughout the house.

COMMITTEE IN CHARGE.

With this excellent refuge provided, mothers need feel no anxiety in regard to their little ones, the names of the committee in charge being sufficient guarantee of the safety of their charges. This committee comprises Zina Y. Caldwell, L. Smith, Ardella Bardley, Maria B. Winder and Grace Mackey Smith, and under them will be a corps of attendants whose services will be devoted unflinchingly to the comfort and safe-keeping of their little charges.

The institution will be permanent, that is, it will be conducted semi-annually during the conference sessions, probably at the same place, until a permanent nursery can be provided, insuring the future convenience of visitors. The privilege will surely prove an inestimable one for the mothers, who are compelled to bring their little ones with them during their conference sojourn in the city.

The day nursery is an established institution in a number of the large cities here and abroad, the object being to provide a place for those who come from the country for shopping or other purposes, and such an institution in this city will meet a very palpable and crying need.
