many Ring.

New York, 25.—The News says the

preliminary movement on the "ring"

commenced by an action in equity will

be prosecuted by the general committee

against Tweed, Ingersoll and Garvey,

who are to be arrested immediately.

The corporation counsel, O'Gorman,

has associated George Ticknor Curtis

with himself in the action in behalf of

the city to recover monies alleged to

have been fraudulently obtained.
