Previous to ihis, he had annulled the concession of the asphalt company in the state of Germudez, a concession which for ten years or more had been yielding the country a large annual revenue. He then sold the asphalt prop-erty, which had been purchased years before in fee simple from the govern-ment of Venezuela. The asphalt company protested and carried its case into the Venezuelan courts where it was rewarded with an adverse decision. Then the company brought its case to Washington and placed it before the United States government. The state department immediately sent instructions re-garding it to Minister Loomis in Cara-cas. These instructions Loomis carried out to the letter.

This precipitated the present trouble in Venezuela.

Meanwhile, it is said by excellent au-thorities that each of the entire diplo-matic corps in Caracas is posting his government daily regarding the state of affairs.

Senor Augusto Pulido, charge d' af-Senor Augusto Pundo, charge d'af-faires of the Venezuelar legation, at Washington, examined the article with considerable attention last night at the Waldorf-Astoria. He said: "I believe this article to be greatly exaggerated. Cipriano Castro is not a dictator in any sense of the word. He wan bie offloor sense of the word. He won his office by force of arms, but he has obeyed he constitution since his rise to power

I never heard of the reported amend-ment to the constitution whereby the term of office of president was extended from four years to six. Andrade is not the real president of Venezuela. Neither is Castro. The latter is only a pro-visional president. I do not know even if he will be elected to that office.

"During the troubled months when the whole country was in a state of siege extraordinary measures were necessary to preserve any semblance of order. If these things did occur, it was portraved by your correspondent." Gonzales Esteves, the consul general of Venezuela at this port, refused to discuss the contents of the article say-

## CAUSED BY DOMESTIC WOES

When Spoken to, Called the Men Spies, Shouted "Vendetta! Vendettal" and Began Firing.

Lexington, Ky., April 5 .- With the cry, "The vendetta, the vendetta," on his lips, Gen. Cassius Marcelius Clay, the famous abolitionist and duelist, and former United States minister to Russia, this morning led his little bodyguard to battle against a sheriff's posse, which had gone to Whitehall, his pulatial mansion in Madison county, to serve papers upon the general in a civil sult instituted against him by his daughter, Mrs. Mary B. Clay,

Many shots were fired on each side, and the posse finally departed without accomplishing the purpose of its visit. It is reported that Gen. Clay was wounded in the affray. Fleeing from his supposed enemies, he barricaded himself in his "den" in the mansion, and there he remained guarded by his faithful envents. When we the faithful servants. Whether or not he is wounded is only known to himself and to his little bodyguard. No surgeon has been summoned to the house,

and none dare approach except on invitation. Today's conflict was directly connected with the domestic woes of Gen. Clay, which have darkened the closing years of his life. The principals in the battle were Gen. Clay and two of his body guard, Bud Literell and Jim his body guard, Bud Literen and Bolin, on one side, and Sheriff Coyler, Deputy Terrill and Frank Mason of Madison county, on the other. ### COLOMBIAN REVOLUTION.

#### Late Panama Advices Say it is Far from Ended.

San Francisco, April 6.-The Chronicle says: Private advices received by the steamer City of Sydney from Panama state that the revolution in Colombia is far from ended, and that the rebels are steadily gaining strength.

About the 1st of March Gen. Ulloa, at the head of rebel troops had a flerce battle in Caparrapi, state of Cundina-marca, in which the capital city of Bogota is situated. The government troops were defeated and 250 prisoners, 500 rifles and 25 cases of ammunition were left in the rebel's bands. Gen, Ramon Neiro has won several his victories over government troops in Boyaca, and Gens. Currea and Ibanez keep up the fighting in Cundinamarca and Tolima. In those two states there are reported to be 8,000 rebels Gens. Neiro and Delgodillo have captured Moniquira with 250 government soldiers, Gens. Colmenares, Ulioa and Escobar, after a marked victory at La Palma against 1,200 government troops, have taken positoins in Pacho and San Cayetano, with 1,500 men. Cavetano, with 1,500 men. The situation at Panama is becoming worse and the government is again thinking of leaving the interior to the rebels, or liberals, as they term them-selves. The rebel forces in the interior of Panama now number 2,000 men, of which is builded an armed but as which six hundred are armed, but as oon as the rebels receive the arms and ammunition they have purchased, an army of 5,000 men will be available to move against Panama. The revolution has been in progress since Oct. 8, 1899.

It is suspected that the Scornion will join the soundron at Culebrao from whence daily despatch boats arrive at San Juan. There has evi-dently been some delay in the departure from La Guayra of Minister Loomis. Naval officials here profess ignorance of the whereabouts of Loomis. Avila Blanco,

#### Internal Revenue Receipts Record.

New York, April 6 .- A new record for a day's receipts for internal revenue collection districts has been established at the office of Charles H. Treat, of the Second district of New York, where \$515,385 was the total amount received, almost the entire sum being paid for documentary stamps. Nearly five hund-red \$100 stamps were disposed of to the great corporations with offices in this Whataver we may say about cor-

porations," said Collector Treat, "they certainly pay a generous part of the taxes of the people. We shall probably celve more than \$900,000 from the tax on the stocks and bonds of the new United States Steel corporation."

Mr. Treat did not anticipate a no-ticeable change in the receipts of his office on account of the revised internal venue tax schedule. About \$2,000,000 a year he thought would cover the loss which would result from the war tax reduction. He thought that about \$750.-000 of that sum would be lost to the government through exemption of taxation of medicines and propriety goods.
